

#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Oologah Bank, built in 1906, is a one story, five-sided row commercial building with elements of the style typical for turn-of-the-century business buildings. It has an 8' wall diagonal to the front and side of the structure which forms the northeast corner. Red brick laid in a running bond course serves as the construction material for this 25' by 40' building. It has a flat roof with 2' high parapet.

One of the entranceways to the structure is located in the diagonal wall. It has a wooden door and a screen door. The second entrance is located near the southwest corner of the structure. The door has been removed and the entrance has been boarded from the inside but the door frame is still intact. At each entrance there is a two-step stoop.

On the front of the structure there are two double transomed windows immediately adjacent to each other. On the west side there are two transomed double windows and a single 1/1 sash window. On the rear of the structure there are two single 1/1 sash windows. There are no windows on the east side.

Though the Oologah Bank is a fairly simple structure, there are some brick embellishments which add character to the building. Above all the entrances and single windows there are segmental relieving arches. Those above the windows are incorporated into the wall and those above the entrances are laid on the wall, creating a three-dimensional effect. On each corner of the structure and framing the entrances there are polychromatic pilaster strips. The parapet is decorated with polychromatic toothing topped by a stretcher course of bricks.

Oologah Bank occupies a corner lot in what was formerly the Central Business District of Oologah. The surrounding area is now one of mixed land-use with residential and commercial properties intermingled.

Structural alterations to Oologah Bank have been minor and affect the integrity of the structure only minimally. The original window on the front of the structure has been replaced and the door on the south side has been removed. Most of the major interior features are still intact including the original molded tin ceilings and the bank vault.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Oologah Bank Building is significant because: (1) it was one of the first banks in northeastern Oklahoma having been completed in 1906 when Oologah was still a town in Indian Territory and (2) it served as the only bank in the area for over twenty years and existed as a commercial building for approximately seventy years.

Prior to statehood in 1907, Oologah emerged as an Indian Territory coal mining boom town. It quickly became a shipping point for coal mined in the area because of its location on the Iron Mountain and Southern railroad line. It also served as a service center for the mining camps and related industries as well as the already-existent agricultural economy. Because of the various financial transactions, need for a bank was soon realized by area residents. The Oologah Bank was constructed in 1906 to fulfill that need by providing a safe depository for money, a source of currency and credit, and other financial operations.

The Oologah Bank was the only financial institution in the region for over twenty years. Completion of the bank represented a vital step in transforming the community from one dependent upon only agriculture to one with a more diversified economic base and vital to the economic history of northeastern Oklahoma.

During the mid-1940s, the bank operations moved to more spacious quarters and, for the next thirty years, the building housed an antique dealership carrying on the commercial tradition of the building. Since the mid-1970s, the building has been used in the production of hand-held bellows for fireplaces, a small "cottage"-type industry.
