Describe present and historic physical appearance:

The Lake Leatherwood Park Historic District is a municipal park of approximately 1600 acres owned by the City of Eureka Springs. The focal point of the park is a 100 acre lake formed by Lake Leatherwood Dam. Lake Leatherwood Dam and the "Lake Leatherwood Recreational Facilities," which consists of the bathhouse and the picnic shelter (referred to as the barbecue pit in that nomination), were listed individually in the National Register on August 12, 1992 as amendments to the "Facilities Constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps in Arkansas, 1933 - 1942" multiple property nomination. These properties exemplify the Rustic style as executed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and provide a solid foundation for the proposed district.

#### Lake Leatherwood Dam

Lake Leatherwood Dam (#20 on the accompanying map) is a cut stone, masonry dam that is 630 feet in length and 55 feet in height. Its solid cement core is faced with hand-cut limestone that was mined at the nearby quarry.

#### Bath House

The bathhouse (#16), which was completed about the same time as the dam, is composed of a central section that is 27'11" long, 27'9" wide with wings on the northern and southern elevations measuring 29'11" long and 16'7" wide. The bathhouse rests upon a substantial fieldstone foundation. The battered slope of the foundation is continued for the first few feet of the wide, rough-sawn weatherboard walls. The center section is covered by a composition-shingled, hipped roof with the wings and the projecting front porch capped with clipped gables. The eaves feature large exposed rafter tails, and the two end gables have four false projecting oak beams. Due to

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their constant exposure to the elements, the beams had rotted and were repaired/replaced with matching wood this year (1997) by the Eureka Springs

The most prominent feature of the bathhouse is the robust front porch on the eastern elevation. The raised stone floor of the porch is accessed by three stone stairs (center and angled from each side), and the clipped-gable roof is supported by six wood posts on stone piers.

#### Picnic Shelter

The picnic shelter (#15) is an open structure measuring 17' wide and 15' long. Constructed of rough oak posts on a stone foundation, the shelter is covered by a wood shake, side-gable roof. In the center of the shelter is a large stone-constructed, double fireplace. Since the original nomination, the picnic shelter has been restored and is in excellent condition.

In addition to those three resources, Lake Leatherwood Park contains a number of other buildings, structures, and sites that were designed and constructed by the CCC but were previously unrecorded. The park also contains a number of resources that date before or after the CCC period. A planning blueprint entitled "Area of Development (Planning)" for "Eureka Springs Conservation and Recreation and approved on January 19, 1939 provides an interesting insight into the proposed development of the park. Unfortunately, it does not distinguish between buildings and structures planned and actually constructed. An October 2, 1942 inventory lists the CCC-built resources and the older buildings and structures extant at the time; thus, a fair estimate of the total CCC involvement at Lake Leatherwood can be inferred.

#### I. BUILDINGS

#### Powder Magazine Building

Located on the eastern side of West Leatherwood Creek near the southern boundary of the park, the powder magazine building (#4) was constructed on the original farm road that has since been obliterated. This structure was described in an October 2, 1942 inventory of the park as "stone and concrete construction, rough oak floor, sheet iron roof, 12'7" long, 10'7" wide, 1 front entrance." and valued at \$400. This description however, fails to accurately depict the substantial nature of the coursed stone construction and massiveness of the 3" thick, poured concrete door that is hung with heavy duty iron strap hinges and secured with a draw bolt. Vents are located below the shed roof, which slopes to the side elevation instead of the rear, and below the wood floor. The building remains as described in 1942 and is in excellent condition considering its abandoned status.

#### Caretaker's Dwelling

In the 1942 inventory of the park buildings, the caretaker's dwelling is described as "19'4" wide, 28'3" long, constructed of rough oak lumber, 4 rooms & bath, dressed pine floors, shake roof, electrically wired, 3 outside entrances, 15 windows and was valued at \$3,000.

This building deviates from the standard CCC Rustic style by having a restrained Colonial Revival-style appearance (though it was most likely dubbed a "Modern-style" design when constructed). The wood-frame building rests upon a combination poured concrete and stone continuous foundation (concrete is used on the east and west facades while stone is utilized for the north and south elevations). The irregular-plan house is clad with white-painted, wide weatherboard and is covered by a composition-shingled, side gable roof with a projecting gable on the front elevation and a rear shed addition.

The front, or northern, elevation is accessed by a set of limestone stairs descending from the road. The elevation is composed of the projecting gable bay to the east that is fenestrated by two six-over-six, double-hung wood windows and a lunette-shaped wood louvered vent. A narrow entrance with a batten-style wood door with a small upper six-pane light is placed in the western wall of this bay. This entrance was apparently used to enter the office, while the regular house entrance faces north adjacent to the junction of the cross-gable bay. This entrance contains an identical, albeit wider, door. Two more six-over-six, double-hung windows complete the description of the northern elevation.

The eastern elevation contains four six-over-six windows and a lunette attic vent. The rear, or southern, elevation is considerably elevated due to the slope of the hillside. It contains two six-over-six windows, a much smaller six-over-six bathroom window, and the rear sleeping porch, which was added sometime after the original construction. The sleeping porch is fenestrated by a ribbon of multiple-pane hopper type windows and contains a single-leaf entry into the nearly full height basement. The western elevation has two six-over-six windows and a lunette attic vent on the main body of the house; the remainder of the elevation is composed of the wrap-around sleeping porch addition, which is entered through an eight-light door underneath an open gable porch. From the doorway, concrete stairs descend alongside the house to the south.

A stacked rock retaining wall, a barbecue pit, and two wood-frame outbuildings are contributing structures to the nomination.

A double-pen log barn of indeterminate age is located further to the south of the caretaker's dwelling. The western pen is approximately sixteen feet square with small, saddle-notched, round logs with an average width of approximately six inches. The eastern pen has completely collapsed. corrugated metal roof remains over the western pen.

#### II. STRUCTURES

CCC Road

During the development of Lake Leatherwood Park, a new road was constructed by the CCC. Now designated County Road 61, the road has been paved from U.S. Highway 62 to the bathhouse/boat dock area. The original road to the dam is still used as a service road by park employees and is also a part of the recently opened Beacham Trail. The trail continues across the dam, and a

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portion of the trail follows the old road to the quarry. Although the road can now be categorized into three separate segments, the entire system is considered a contributing structure.

#### Culverts

Along County Road 61 leading in to the park are six stone culverts and two stone bridges that were constructed by the CCC. The culverts (#s 2, 3, 5, 7, 8, 11) are all constructed of rough-cut stone but vary in size and in design. All have a raised inlet box, and an arched outlet. Culvert substantially larger than the other culverts and could also be described as a small bridge.

#### Bridges

The two bridges on County Road 61 are similar in construction to the culverts. Bridge #6 is a single-arch design with a curved gravel deck. Remnants of the small concrete post barrier are still visible. Bridge #9, also known as the Mulladay Hollow Bridge, is a double-arched design with a curved gravel deck. The concrete barrier posts are likewise deteriorated/missing.

#### Boat Dock

The boat dock is located on the lake to the north of the bathhouse at the terminus of County Road 61. It was described in the 1942 inventory as being 44'11" long, 10' wide with six wings, each 18' long, 4' wide. It is a fixed design being supported by concrete piers. The basic layout has been retained; however, a metal-clad, gable roof has been added over the formerly open dock. Also the 1942 inventory describes storage compartments along he center section that are no longer extant. Still, with its basic design intact and original mooring rings present, the dock retains sufficient integrity to be considered as contributing to the nomination.

To the north of the boat dock is a concrete launching ramp that is probably of modern construction.

#### Designed Landscape Features

As with most CCC-constructed parks, landscape design was an integral component in the planning of Lake Leatherwood Park. Although much of the proposed buildings and landscaping never came to fruition, the park still boasts a number of significant landscape features. From the front porch of the bathhouse, there are two limestone paths. One leads to the diving tower platform and the other angles toward the boat dock area. At the terminus of the latter path, a small concrete and stone drinking fountain is placed to the side. A similar fountain is located to the south of the picnic shelter. Remnants of a lake wall remain between the boat dock and the diving tower platform. The rock benches in the swimming beach area (described below) were also part of the CCC landscape design.

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#### III. SITES

The park contains at least six distinct sites that are contributing to the nomination. These include the old Highway 62 roadside rest stop, the swimming beach area, the CCC quarry, the CCC campsite, the barn and well house area, and a Victorian-era farmhouse site.

#### Old Roadside Rest Stop

The former roadside rest stop on U.S. Highway 62 (#1 on accompanying map) was in operation from the 1930s through the 1950s. Although the rest stop is not known to have been constructed by the CCC, it is considered a contributing site to this nomination due to its location within the park boundaries and its potential to yield further information int he future through archeological research.

#### Swimming Beach

The CCC-designed and constructed swimming beach area (#17) is composed of the stone and concrete diving tower platform, the swimming area outlined with concrete posts, and a limestone retaining wall with bench seats fashioned from the rock placement. The diving platform has two short steel ladders on either side for water-to-platform access and one long ladder on the tall eastern elevation. There are provisions for a low and high diving board, and the high diving board can be reached from ground level by stone steps on the southern side of the tower. The simple concrete barrier pots that outline th swimming area to the south of the diving platform had deteriorated from over fifty years of water exposure and were recently recapped with new concrete. Thus, this area, contains one contributing site - the swimming beach area as a whole - and two contributing structures - the diving platform and the retaining wall-bench.

#### CCC Quarry and Campsite

The CCC quarry and campsite are located on the eastern side of the lake in the northeast corner of the park and are labeled #21 and #22 respectively on the map. Evidence of the quarry remains along a shelf of limestone along ht hillside for approximately one quarter mile. Drill marks and some roughfashioned stones can still be seen at this site. In comparison, there is no above-ground evidence of the CCC campsite; however, both sites contribute to the nomination for their direct association with the CCC camp at Lake Leatherwood and for their potential to yield additional information through archeological research.

#### Old Farmhouse Site

Located to the north of the quarry, the Victorian-era farmhouse site (#24) reveals a foundation, root cellar, and a spring box. This was one of several farmsteads that were razed by the CCC during the construction of the park and is important for its archeological potential.

Barn and Well house Area

The barn and well house area (also known as the stable area) is located about 3/16 of a mile west of the lake and is south of County Road 61 (#10). Entering the stable area from the east, there are concrete foundations to the north which are divided into three compartments (center section is the widest, eastern two have concrete floors; no floor on western foundation). To the south is a small single-story shed resting upon a concrete foundation and clad with rough-sawn weatherboard. Double-leaf doors are located on the south elevation of the shed, and a wire fence extends to the south at the junction with a cut-limestone retaining wall that extends the length of the southern boundary of the stable area. In the center of the lot is a small concrete foundation with two pipes projecting from the ground to the west of the foundation.

The well house and the spring house are located near the northwest corner of the stable area. Both structures rest upon poured concrete foundations and are clad with rough-sawn weatherboard. The well house is the eastern building of the pair and is covered by a corrugated-metal, gable roof. Large double-leaf doors of recent construction constitute the front, or southern elevation, while a modern single-leaf steel door is located on the western elevation.

The spring house is positioned to the west and slightly to the north of the well house. The spring house is capped by a corrugated-metal, shed roof which slopes to the north. A single-leaf door is found on the southern elevation, and a stationary four-pane wood window is found on both the east and west elevations.

The barn is located along the western end of the lot. Essentially divided into six bays, the wood-frame building is covered by a corrugated-metal, shed roof that slopes to the west. The southern two bays are enclosed with vertical wood siding on the front, or eastern, elevation and contain two single-leaf doors. The remainder of the bays are open, and the center section has collapsed due to roof failure. A cut-limestone retaining wall also extends the length of the western boundary of the stable area and forms the foundation of the stable shed. To the south of the southern retaining wall near the southwest corner of the lot is a rectangular concrete cisternlike structure.

The barn and well house area is counted as one contributing site.

#### IV. NONCONTRIBUTING BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES

Cabins

In 1954, five rental cabins (#14) and the boat dock office (#18) were constructed. Cabins 1 trough 4 are arranged numerically in ascending order from County Road 61 along a semi-circular drive that loops around to the west of the bathhouse and connects with the main road before it reaches the launching ramp and boat dock. Cabin 5 is located to the north of Cabin 1 on the northern side of County Road 61.

These cabins are constructed of concrete block on a poured concrete slab foundation. The exterior walls are coated with a rough-textured stucco while the interior walls are finished with a smoother plaster.

Boat Dock Office

Also built around 1954 is the boat dock office. Located on the lakeshore opposite the boat dock, this building is constructed of concrete block without the stucco veneer.

Virtually unaltered, the cabins and the boat dock office are excellent examples of simple 1950s construction. Despite their "modern" styling, the buildings harmonize well with the more celebrated CCC-built environment and should be considered as contributing resources once they attain fifty years of age.

Water Tank

In 1955 a steel water tank (#12) was installed. The 15,000 gallon tank still provides a gravity flow water supply to the park.

Picnic Tables

Also believed to have been added in the 1950s are current eight concrete picnic tables. The 1942 inventory describes three different types of classic CCC Rustic style picnic tables and benches that have not survived.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and period of significance noted above:

This nomination seeks to recognize the entire property comprising Lake Leatherwood Park as a National Register Historic District. Previously, Lake Leatherwood Dam and Recreational Facilities, consisting of the bathhouse and the picnic shelter, were listed individually in the National Register on August 12, 1992. Since that time, additional AHPP survey efforts through the initiation of the Eureka Springs Parks Commission have revealed a large number of additional buildings, structures, and sites within the park that were constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps as well as resources dating before and after the CCC period. It is being nominated under Criteria A, C, and D with local significance.

#### Historical Background

The creation of Lake Leatherwood was but one of several projects carried out in Arkansas with the involvement - or under the direct supervision of - the Soil Conservation Service (SCS). Organized in 1935 during the first administration of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the SCS owed its existence to President Roosevelt's vision regarding the threats posed to both the American landscape and American agriculture by erosion and outdated farming techniques that depleted the soil. Though the magnitude and seriousness of this problem was no more dramatically illustrated than during the dust storms of 1937 and 1935 that literally carried thousands of tons of drought-parched soil from the Great Plains eastward, creating the infamous "Dust Bowl," the first incarnation of this federal agency was actually created a year previous with the establishment of the Soil Erosion Service, organized under the Department of the Interior. By 1935, Congress passed the Soil Conservation Act, formally establishing the Soil Conservation Service as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In Carrying out the various conservation projects with which they were charged, both agencies made use of Civilian Conservation Corps labor, with the SCS supervising as many as 454 CCC camps nationwide by 1936.

The Soil Conservation Service's legacy in Arkansas did not actually begin until 1937. In February of that year, President Roosevelt sent a letter to all state governors requesting the passage of legislation authorizing the establishment of soil conservation districts as political subdivisions of the state. The Arkansas General Assembly happened to be in session at the time, and Governor Carl E. Bailey's office drafted legislation to respond to President Roosevelt's request. On March 3, 1937, Governor Bailey signed the bill into law and by November of that year four soil conservation districts had been drawn and approved. Thereafter, SCS embarked on a number of conservation projects aimed at erosion prevention and soil enrichment throughout these initial four districts, with the construction of Lake Leatherwood premier among them.

The Lake Leatherwood Dam and associated buildings were constructed by the

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Works Progress Administration under the direction of the recently established SCS with Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) labor. The work was commenced in 1938 and ended with the interruption of World War II. The lake was constructed as a recreational project to provide canoeing, sailing, fishing, and swimming for the local residents; however, it was also built as a soil and erosion control project, with the goal of preventing the continuing loss of woodland and potential housing sites at the northern end of West Leatherwood Creek.

Upon completion of the dam, the federal government leased the property around the lake to various concessionaires. Later the government deeded the 1600 acre property to the City of Eureka Springs with the agreement that the property would always be opened to the public and never sold into private hands. The city continued the concessionaire arrangement until 1994 when the lease for Verna Maberry expired. The city now operates the park under the auspices of the Eureka Springs Parks Commission.

Lake Leatherwood Park Historic District is being nominated under Criteria A, C and D with local significance as an amendment to the "Facilities Constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps in Arkansas, 1933-1942" multiple property nomination. The park is significant under Criterion A for its direct association with the CCC. Under Criterion C, the park is significant for the design features of the CCC-built buildings, and under Criterion D, the park possesses significant archeological potential which may yield more information regarding the development of Lake Leatherwood.
