



was to restore the building to its original appearance. A shed porch (see photo) across the front was removed; logs were rechinked with cement; the building was reroofed with hand-split red oak shakes; the foundation was reinforced with cement blocks; interior wall covering installed by the previous occupants --said to be pasteboard and paper-was removed; both fireplaces were cleaned and repaired with no alteration to their original composition or design; logs, which had been creosoted by the previous occupants, were given another coating of creosote; windows and doors were repaired without altering the size; the space to the rear in the west pen was enclosed for use as a bathroom and storage area.
