DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Minimal maintenance has been done on the Swett ranch since it was sold by the Swett Estate in 1970. The improvements are in good to poor condition. About seven and a half miles of log fence still exist and restoration of it has begun. Several miles of irrigation canal (see attached) grid the fields. They need some erosion control and cleaning. Most of the pastures are still in good shape with only a little noxious weed control necessary.

Several buildings were constructed for ranching operations and include: lambing sheds, de-horning sheds, and corrals, a milking barn, blacksmith shops, a granary-tack shack, a workshop-stable, pig and chicken sheds, a horse corral, a meat house, a dairy shed, and a root cellar (see attached). Only those structures that are located in or near the 14.1 acre area recommended for National Register status are candidates for restoration. These are marked by asterisks on the attached sheet. They will be described here in order of their listing there. The milking barn is a three-sided log building. It has an angle roof, a ceiling, and a wooden floor. The dimensions are: width 26' 10", length 21', wall height 7'. There are two blacksmith shops. The new one replaced the old one (built in 1919) in 1935. The new blacksmith shop is a log structure with a sod roof. It has a dirt floor and windows on the southwestern and eastern walls. The dimensions are: width 16' 10", length 16' 4", wall height 8'. The old blacksmith shop is an unpainted frame building with an angle roof. It has one window on the western wall and a dirt floor. The dimensions are: width 16' 10", length 13', wall height 5' 11". (The old blacksmith shop is presently being restored.) The granary-tack shack is an unpainted frame building with a gabled roof. It has a wooden floor and no windows. The dimensions are: width 19' 8", length 19' 4", wall height 9 1/2'. The workshop-stable is really two separate buildings very close together. The workshop is the Greendale School (originally built in 1919). This structure has a double door, one window, and a dirt floor. It also has electricity installed. The dimensions are: width 22' 7", length 22' 10", wall height 7' 6". The (horse) stable is also logs, with a sod roof and wooden floor. The dimensions are: width 34', length 20', wall height 10'. The pig and chicken sheds are of log construction with sod roofs. One pig pen has a hand-hewn feeding trough with a chute of the same craftsmanship. The dimensions are: (pig sheds) width 16' 8", length 17' 10", wall height 3' 9"; (chicken coop) width 12' 8", length 23' 10", wall height 6' 6". (The latter building was restored this summer (1978) for use for chickens by the ranch caretakers.) The horse corral (collection corral) was built in 1906 and maintained for continued use until 1970. Its original use was for cattle. The meat shed has double board walls with saw dust insulation. The ceiling is of the same construction. The building has a cement floor and is equiped with electricity. (It was originally used for refrigeration.) The dimensions are: width 10' 4", length 12' 5", wall height 8' 5". The dairy shed was built in the early 1900's and had collapsed completely. It was removed in 1976. It should be reconstructed since it was essential to the ranch in the early years for refrigeration. The root cellar is an earthen chamber with three successive doors (to create dead air space and thus regulate the temperature inside the cellar). It has a log roof with alternate layers of latticed boards, cedar shavings, and dirt. Corrugated metal covers the top of all this. It has electricity. The dimensions are: width 12', length 34' 11", wall height 5' 10". (The root cellar was restored this summer (1978).)

Oscar Swett also built five homes for his expanding family. The first one was his mother's homestead cabin. Built in 1909, it was a one room log cabin. It has since deteriorated extensively and there are no plans (at present) to restore it. A historic marker is planned for it, though. Oscar's homestead cabin was built in 1912. It was also a one room log cabin with two windows and a wooden floor. The dimensions are: width 14' 8", length 18' 10", wall height 8' 3". (The roof was replaced in 1976.) A two room log cabin was built in 1918. It has two doors, three windows, and a wooden floor. It also has electricity installed. The dimensions are: width 29' 8", length 23' 7", wall height 8' 5". A five room frame house was built in 1929. This building is painted white and has two porches. A plumbed bathroom is attached to the south side. The house has three doors and seven windows. It is equiped with electricity and hot and cold running water. The dimensions are: width 29' 8", length 46' 2", wall height 7' 8". The five room house is presently serving as a caretaker's residence. A four room log house was built in the late '30's-early '40's for Oscar Swett's married son, Louis. It has plastered walls and wooden floors. There are two doors and five windows. Running water and electricity are installed, but no bathroom. This dwelling will not be restored as a historic structure.

The Swett Ranch was operated by horse-powered equipment from 1909 to 1970. Much of this equipment is still on the ranch (see attached inventory) and is in serviceable condition. There are hand plows, riding plows, a wood leveler, a grain drill, hay movers, hay rakes, bull rakes, a bob sled, wagons, hay stackers, a hay ram, ditchers, road graders, and a binder. The riding plows are of two types--one way and ~~and~~ two way. The one way model performs one operation only and the two way one can accomplish two different tasks, i. e., plowing and harrowing. The grain drill plants seed. Hay mowers are used in harvesting. Hay rakes gather the hay that is mowed. Bull rakes lift the hay off the ground for the hay ram to push over the hay stacker and down into rounded stacks on the opposite side of the stacker. The binder secures the hay in manageable portions. Ditchers are used in digging irrigation trenches. The road graders were left on the property when the local ranchers were no longer required to help the state with road maintenance. The wagons include a hay wagon, logging wagon, and general purpose wagon. Several pieces of tack (horse trappings) have been left on the ranch by the Swett family, as well. Some of this has been rehabilitated and is in useable condition.

A few furnishings and some household equipment is still at the ranch (see attached inventory) and Swett family members and local residents (of Daggett County) have additional household equipment they would loan or donate when an interpretive program is developed at the ranch.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Swett Ranch is representative of the pioneer homestead carved out of the western wilderness around the turn-of-the-century. It is a window where we can, today, look back to a time normally relegated to the pages of history books. It provides a picture of establishing a homestead and the day-to-day experiences of living there.

The special significance of the Swett Ranch is that, even though its history spans nearly 60 years, evidence of the earliest stages of its development still exist along side the more recent ones. Some furnishings and implements have been left on the ranch by the Swett family. Members of the family and local residents in the Greendale area have other ranch artifacts.

The Swett Ranch is a pioneer homestead. The Swett and Green men were running cattle on the land as early as 1906. Then in 1909 family life was set up when Oscar Swett built his mother (Elizabeth) a one room cabin on her homestead entry. Oscar Swett's father (Lyman) was from Massachusetts. He was a scout for pioneers from the East going West. Then he was a Mormon homesteader in Payson, Utah. Lyman Swett was quite a bit older than his wife and died in 1908. Elizabeth then left Payson with her children and settled in Greendale near some relatives. She only stayed on the new ranch about two years before she moved to Vernal. Oscar, who was born in 1890, stayed on to manage it with his family until he died in 1968. (His brother, Jim, had an adjoining ranch of his own.)

The Oscar Swett homestead eventually totaled 237 acres. Its pastures were grubbed out of the sagebrush. The fences were of log poles from nearby forests. A canal was dug with horses and hand tools to collect stream water for the pastures. The Swett family had to be mostly self-sufficient, since town was two days or more away (by wagon). Several buildings were constructed for ranching operations. The ranch was operated with horse-drawn equipment until 1970.

The three houses the Swett family used over the years stand within 60 feet of each other. Water was piped into the largest house in the early 1950's; a modern bathroom was added in the early 1960's. A generator provided electrical power starting in 1954, commercial power arriving in 1960.

~~By the early '60's,~~ ^{in the early years} There were about eight families in the Greendale area. "Civilization" in the immediate vicinity consisted of the Green River Ranger Station and the Greendale School. There were a few other scattered ranches in the Ashley Valley but, Vernal (about 50 miles away) was the nearest sizeable population center. Then in 1916 there was talk of creating a new county. People in the district were paying taxes, but could not even get their roads repaired. So they took their case to Vernal and found support for their cause. 74 voters in the area voiced their appreciation. Daggett County came into being on November 16, 1917, with Manila as the county seat.

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8 SIGNIFICANCE (con'd.)

Oscar Swett's son, Louis, operated the ranch after Oscar's death until it was sold to Mark Eggertsen, a Salt Lake City land developer in March, 1969. The Forest Service acquired the property in 1970.

A management plan and an Environmental Analysis Report have been prepared for the Swett Ranch. They emphasize interpretation of the historical resources and some utilization of the ranch for environmental education activities. The ranch will probably be set up as a museum at first and possibly as a "living ranch" later. A visit to it will be a first person experience for the general public. Visitors will see the ranch set up as closely as possible to how it was in the early 1900's.

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

- IRRIGATION CANALS

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


