DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present brick church which is listed by the official Montana state highway map as "one of the three most beautiful churches in the world," was built in 189 and is in good condition as far as appearance is concerned. On the original site, selected in 1854, a log cabin residence was built across the road from the present Holy Family Hospital; it is still extant but has been moved 400 yards next to the church so it may be visited in conjunction with the church. In 1864, a large wooden church was built to replace a former primitive chapel; it is no longer extant.

In 1891, the cornerstone of the new brick church was layed, and the church soon became a landmark in the valley. The exterior dimensions are 120 feet by 60 feet. The belfry is nearly 100 feet high. The exterior brick was obtained and fired in the vicinity of the mission.

The interior of the church with figures and scenic murals depicting the complete history of man's relation to God overshadows the exterior. The mural of St. Ignatius, vested for Holy Mass, appears over the main altar. A mural of Our Lady is to the left; a mural of St. Joseph is on the right. These outstanding paintings and murals are the work of Brother Joseph Carignano, S.J., (b. Turin, Italy, 1853 - d. Yakima, Washington, 1919) who devoted 14 months of unremittent, arduous labor to the completion of these works of art, in the late 1800's. The paintings are not without artistic merit and although not entirely original in concept, they do manifest the ability of a true artist in their execution, particularly so when it is considered that Brother Carignano never had any professional art training.

In 1952, the interior of the church was completely restored at considerable expense, and shortly thereafter the present stained glass windows were installed. A pressing problem is the need to repoint the mortar between the exterior of the bricks so the magnificent interior paintings which are in excellent shape will not suffer from moisture deterioration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

St. Ignatius Mission was originally established by Jesuit Father Peter deSmet, Indian missionary, and Father Adrian Hoecken, on the Pend d'Oreille River near the town of Cusick, Washington, in 1844. The site was unfavorable, its greatest drawback being that it was not centrally located to serve the At the Indians' request, the mission was transferred, in 1854, to its present location at St. Ignatius

On September 24, 1854, Father Hoecken and Father Menetry arrived to establish the mission, and they were soon joined by Brothers McGean, Claessens and Specht. Open air masses were held among the Pend d'Oreille and Kalispell Indians. Following the building of the log cabin residence built in 1854, a chapel, cabin, blacksmith and carpenter shops, and later in 1864, a flour mill and saw mill were established. Farming was undertaken. In many ways, the mission was the cradle of development and civilization in this area. one of the first settlements in the northwest with a resident school for Indians and a trade school besides.

By 1855, more than a thousand Indians had gathered to make their permanent home at the mission. In 1864, a boarding school was set up under the Sisters of Providence from Mont-In 1888 a school for boys was established, and in 1890, the Ursuline Sisters opened a nursery school. Ignatious reached its fullest development from 1890 to 1896 when as many as 320 Indian children were being educated and taught trades. A branch opened in the Jocko Valley for Flathead Indian children. The extent of studies and trades taught the Indian children was highly progressive for its time. In the late 1800's, Senator Vest toured the area and wrote of St. Ignatius: "In all my wanderings in Montana last summer, I saw but one ray of light on the subject of Indian I am a Protestant--born one, educated one, expect education. to die one--but I say now that the system adopted by the Jesuits is the only practical system for the education of the Indian, and the only one that has resulted in anything at all."

8. SIGNIFICANCE (continued)

In 1896, an Act of Congress denying further government help to all Indian mission schools dealt a severe blow to St. Ignatius. By 1901, only forty-seven boys remained at St. Ignatius. Today, the mission still operates for the Flathead Indian children and is still the religious center for the Flathead tribe on the reservation.

The magnificent church is the only remaining visible reminder of the foregone era. With its paintings and murals of considerable magnitude by Brother Carignano, and the vital role the mission played in the education and religion of the Indians, the mission's significance in the fields of religious art and American Indian education and religion are evident.
