Garage doors replaced, original door transoms bricked up, door added and brick replaced between garage doors, some rear and side windows bricked up.

36. Information sources/References

This fire station was one of two built by the city of Grand Forks in 1907.¹ This was the south side fire station. The north side fire station sits on the lot just west of City Hall on Second Avenue North and has been recently condemned by the city to permit green space next to City Hall. The south side station has had fewer alterations to the front facade than its north side counterpart. (Cont.) 37. Reason for significance:

One of two early brick fire stations in Grand Forks. The other station has been condemned by the city. Both of the 1907 stations have been replaced by a new centrally-located facility on Washington Street.

8A Architectural Description (Continued)

The front (west) elevation of the fire station is faced in yellow Hebron brick with butter joints laid in a stretcher bond. Polished granite blocks form pier bases and corners. The original first story window transoms have been bricked in and a door has been added between the original fire engine doors.

Between the first and second stories, two name blocks with the legends "Hook & Ladder No. 1" and "Hose Company No. 2" flank a central date block with the legend "1907". These blocks are polished granite and are mounted flush with the brickwork. Four brick pilaster strips sitting on polished granite base blocks divide the remaining stories of the front elevation into three bays. The windows in these bays are decorated with pink sandstone sills and modified keystone jack arch lintels. The windows are 1/1 doublehung sash with aluminum storms and screens. Each bay is surmounted by a dentillated corbel course.

The second story is surmounted by a corbel course which is capped with sandstone suggesting a cornice. Above this cornice the parapet is divided by the pilaster capitals which extend above the parapet. The central portion of this parapet has another name block in sandstone which carries the legend "Fire Department."

The side and rear elevations are common brick laid in a common bond. There are stone sills on the side windows and brick segmented arched lintels on the window openings, some of which have been boarded shut.

36 Information sources/References (Continued)

According to the City Planning office, the location of the Great Northern tracks bisecting the downtown necessitated the construction of two fire stations, one north and one south of the tracks. This plan enabled fire equipment to answer emergency calls without waiting for trains. ₂The two brick fire stations replaced an earlier frame building erected in 1895.
