

### **Description:**

The Caleb Baldwin Tavern (Photographs 1 and 2) is a 2 1/2-story wood-shingled house built about 1763. The house has a center-hall plan, resulting in two large brick chimneys emerging near the ends of the gable roof, which has its ridge line set parallel to the street. The main entry, centered on the west elevation, has been remodeled twice, once in the Federal period and again in the Victorian period (Photograph 3). The paneled door is flanked by pilasters supporting an arched molding. The fanlight within is delicately leaded in a sunburst radial pattern, with a cast-lead American eagle at the center point. To either side of the doorway are double-hung sidelights, and the whole is sheltered by a flat-roofed porch on turned posts, with jig-sawn corner brackets and a spindled frieze. The south-side entrance, a frame of simple stepped moldings, probably is similar to what the front entrance had originally. The first floor windows are Victorian or early 20th-century in origin, with old 12-pane and 6-pane sash in place on the second and attic stories.

The house is sited within a densely built village, listed on the National Register of Historic Places as the Newtown Borough Historic District, separated from its neighbors only by driveways and small side yards. Tall shade trees and a slate sidewalk, dating from the Village Improvement movement of the late 19th century, are in front of the house. To the rear is a gambrel roofed board-sided barn probably dating from the early 20th century (Photograph 4).

#### Significance:

The Caleb Baldwin Tavern is significant for its associations with an important event in Connecticut's Colonial-Period military history: the march through the state of French forces, under the command of Count Rochambeau, on their way to the battle of Yorktown. Newtown was occupied for several days by the French at the end of June, 1781, and again on the return march in October, 1782. On the forward march, units that arrived first rested in Newtown until they were joined by other units, so that the army could proceed into New York State, closer to British-held territory, in a more concentrated formation. Newtown was already a fairly built-up village by that point, judging by the French maps. The village's many houses were used to quarter officers, while the troops slept in one of several encampments on the outskirts. This house is believed to have accommodated the army's commissary, Claude Blanchard, who arrived on June 23, five days before the army, to make arrangements for supplying the camps and for a field hospital that was set up in Newtown. Blanchard was joined by de Sançon, his secretary, and several surgeons and apothecaries, the next day. The Caleb Baldwin Tavern serves to recall not only the social intercourse between the French and Americans that occurred at these places of entertainment and lodging, but also the organizational complexity of the march, which required persons skilled in logistics, medicine, and a host of other special areas.

Although the building has been changed from its appearance at the time, enough remains to suggest its 18th-century origin. The double-chimney, center-hall plan was just then supplementing the traditional center-chimney form in Connecticut houses, so such an arrangement can be considered as appropriate for a house built in the 1760s. The small-pane sash, five-bay form, and simple side entrance also reflect traditional vernacular building techniques from the period. The shingled exterior, while not necessarily original or even a replacement for original shingles, represents one of two common methods of finishing the exterior of colonial New England houses, the other being clapboards. These distinguishing characteristics, which help substantiate the house's 18th-century identity, are not visually outweighed by the Federal and Victorian modifications.

Although primarily significant for its associations with the march of Rochambeau, the house also has architectural significance under Criterion C. In addition to its value as a house that embodies the traditional New England building traditions of the 18th century, the house is notable for its Federal Period (c.1790-1820) doorway. In its search for elegance, the Federal or Adam style employed a free interpretation of finely proportioned geometric and Classical forms. This aesthetic is well exemplified in the house's slender pilasters and delicately leaded fanlight.

The attribution of the house as a place of lodging for French officers is based on local historical traditions, written down as early as Ezra Johnson's accounts (1917), and on Claude Blanchard's diary, which records his place of lodging as "near one of the temples (i.e., churches)." At that time, the Congregational Church stood only a short distance away in the middle of the intersection of present-day Church Hill Road and Main Street.
