Ten rooms with 14'6" ceilings. Indoor bathrooms added in 1916-17, and the kitchen remodelled in 1963. Good condition. Frame outbuildings date from late nineteenth and twentieth century. The surrounding land is both orchards and timber. HISTORY Current Use Residence Historic Use Residence 1916-1917; 1865 -Construction Date1867 Architect/Builder Date of Alterations 1963 Historical Narrative: Built immediately after the Civil War by W.H. Felton at a cost of approximately \$5,000, the Felton House was made from lumber and brick found on the land. Felton was the son of Billy Felton (the Billy Place) and his wife was a Crocker (Thronateeska). Cotton and peaches were the money crops on this farm and W.H. Felton, like S.H. Rumph, experimented with refrigerated peach crates. The house was purchased in the 1940's by Richard E. Dodd, who has entertained visitors such as Robert Frost, Donald Davidson, and other outstanding writers. SIGNIFICANCE Architecture; Areas of Significance Agriculture Statement of Significance: The Felton House is important as an excellent example of mid-nineteenth century architecture. Its Italianate villa features are unique to Marshallville and its siting has remained virtually unchanged through the years. 
