The Long Lake Recreation Hall is a historically significant example of the work of Civilian Conservation Corps during the Depression. Located on a lakeshore parcel donated for the purpose, the hall provided a recreational opportunity and a community center for residents of the area. From its completion in 1933 until the 1940s, the hall was used by numerous groups for meetings, outings, social events and the like. It was the only community hall constructed by the CCC in Thurston County. In addition to its historical associations, the hall is an outstanding example of the Rustic Style employed by the CCC. Constructed of peeled logs and handcrafted detail, the building exhibits the use of native materials and skilled craftsmanship that were hallmarks of the style. Other CCC projects in Thurston County included a					

Department of Natural Resources Administration Center, a Black Hills Reforestation Project and Millersylvania State Park. Millersylvania State Park buildings were also constructed in the Rustic idiom. Since 1952, the property has been owned

by the Thurston County Fair and has served as the administrative building of the fair since 1958.

## **Description of Physical Appearance**

The Long Lake Recreation Hall is situated immediately west of Long Lake two miles southeast of Lacey. The massive one and one-half story structure of log construction sits on a post and pier foundation. The tall gable roof is covered with wood shingles and has exposed log rafters and purlins, wide overhangs, and is broken by two central brick chimneys. Walls are of horizontal peeled logs, with vertical log uprights framing the windows. Wood shakes clad the upper gable ends. A recessed porch is centered on the front (south) facade and shelters the main entrance. The porch is topped by an open gable with log fretwork which includes a carved sign reading "HERITAGE HALL." Fenestration is generally tall, single and paired multi-paned windows which are boarded over in the rear of the building. The interior has been altered to accommodate an office and kitchen near the entry. The stage of the main hall has undergone some alteration; however, the large auditorium section with peeled log walls and posts and exposed roof framing is intact. Lighting fixtures from the former Thurston County Courthouse were hung in the auditorium when that structure was abandoned in 1978.

A shed rear addition from the 1950s adjoins the building but is not structurally attached.
