The Honnor-Hosken House is a one-and-one-half story frame structure located at the terminal point of the one-half block long Main Street in North Redwood. Its gable roof on the front section runs the length of the house and includes interior chimneys at either end. The higher ridge line of the rear section runs perpendicular to that of the front and leaves an exposed gablet with circular window. Windows of four panes each and doors on the ground level have pedimented frames. The structure is sheathed in clapboard and the roof is of cedar shingles. The Honnor-Hosken House derives its significance from the settlement, political, and industrial activities of the two principal families which occupied the house from its date of construction until 1956. New York native J.S.G. Honnor joined the McPhail party at the Redwood Falls stockade in 1864, the first year of county post-Sioux uprising settlement. In 1865, he was elected as one of the county's first two commissioners. Hosken acquired the quarrying business from Honnor's son in 1897 and in 1902 he purchased the house and barn as well. The <u>History of Redwood County</u> of 1916 terms the Hosken Granite Works as the most important industry in the county after agriculture. Several monuments to mark the sites of the Indian Uprising were cut by Hosken for the Minnesota Valley Historical Society under the funding of C.O. Gilfillan. He was also known locally for his corn and poultry raising.

Hosken died in 1929. In the late 1930's, his son William also worked in the quarries under a WPA program to quarry stone for several structures in Redwood Falls, including the Ramsey Park Bridge. The house remained in possession of descendents of Hosken family until 1956.

The Honnor-Hosken House is significant as the home of one of Redwood County's most prominent first settlers and as the home of two successive proprietors of one of its most important, albeit small, industries.
