The Temple Farmhouse is located east of Route 31, and in direct line of the proposed I 95. It is about half-way between Ewingville to the south and Pennington to the north in what is presently Hopewell Township.

The original structure was built circa 1710. It was frame rectangular and one and one half story structure with a leanto kitchen to the east. The interior consisted of two rooms on the lower level and a garret.

The western frame section was constructed circa 1750. It contained a central hallway and two parlors on the first floor, three bedrooms at the second level and a garret. The 1750 section projected eighteen feet to the south of the earlier structure. In about 1840 the house obtained its present form - a rectangle with a full two and one half stories. From the south the structure consists of five bays with the doorway in the central bay. The windows are of the sash type with six lights in each sash. The kitchen was extended across the east side after 1840.

The west side has two windows on each level. All are of the sash type. The first and second story levels have sash windows with six lights in each sash. The garret has four lights in each sash. A pent roof divides the gable from the side of the house.

The east side contains the same fenestration above the leanto section. It does not have a pent roof. The north side is similar to the south. The foundation is stone and is under the entire house. The exposed timbers indicate that some replacement of structural members has taken place.

Most of the woodwork, hardware and paneling is from the 1750 period. In the two parlors there is heavy cane molding. The fireplaces in the c. 1750 section are in the far-inside corner of each room. In the other section they are flush with the outside wall, and in each room downstairs and in two bedrooms above. The leanto kitchen fireplace has a bake oven to the right side facing the fireplace.

The house is on a slight knoll with flat land to the rear of the structure and rolling land and a small pond to the southeast. The outbuildings that were originally around the house are no longer extant. ഗ


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From available records and geneologies, it can be concluded that members of the Temple family resided in Hopewell Township and possibly on the farm, as early as c. 1710. The last Temple to reside on the farm was Cornelia. When she died in 1903, it was purchased by Patrick Ryan.

During the American Revolution the farm was one of the forage areas for British troops. Some historians contend that the prized family clock was buried on the grounds to hide it from the British.

Agriculturally, the farmhouse is an example of the kind that was once in the area. The crops grown were also typical of those grown on other farms. It is, however, unique that the land around it has remained mostly undeveloped until the present.
