**Description** The Confederate Monument in Harrodsburg is a granite monument approximately 20 feet tall that consists of two parts, a base and a statute. The base is two stepped with the very bottom slab being rough faced a second tier holding the base of the pedestal, which flares down to meet it. The whole base rises to a height of some 12 feet. It is inscribed on two faces. The east side (front) reads: "C.S.A. / Erected in memory of those brave men who gave their service to the South by Wm Preston Camp No. 96 United Confederate Veterans and their surviving comrades and friends." The west side (rear) reads: "To fight in a just cause and for our country's glory is the best office of the best men." On steel plaques in the ground on all four sides of the monument are verses from the poem "Bivouac of the Dead." The statute that stands above the pedestal is some six feet tall. It is a Confederate cavalryman. It was modeled after Captain Gabe S. Alexander of the 2nd Kentucky Cavalry. The figure is standing with unsheathed sword in his right hand and his left hand is pointing to the letters CSA on his belt buckle. Below the figure on the front of the pedestal is the St. Andrews cross of the Confederate battle flag. Near the bottom of the front of the pedestal is a carved sword and scabbard crossed with a wreath encircling them. On the back of the pedestal is a carved relief of the third national flag of the Confederacy amid flying cannon balls and smoke of battle.

**Statement of Significance** The Confederate Monument in Harrodsburg meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." The monument was erected in 1902 by the United Confederate Veterans. It is a transitional monument. Though it was placed in a cemetery, it does not evoke mourning or sadness. Rather, it is defiant. At the unveiling ceremony the orators spoke of the righteousness of the Confederate cause and one of the speakers bristled at the history that was being written regarding the War. The inscriptions on the monument mirrors the orations, as they praise the cause of the south and the men who served it. The monument is an excellent example of the property type "statue."

**Verbal Boundary Description** - The Confederate Monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet centered on the monument located at the entrance of Springhill Cemetery in Harrodsburg, Kentucky.

**Verbal Boundary Justification** - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
