# Description of present and historic physical appearance:

The Candler County Jail is located in downtown Metter, the county seat of Candler County, in southeast Georgia. It is a two-story, five-bay, painted brick building with a flat roof, featuring characteristics of the Colonial Revival style, constructed in 1916 (photographs 1 and 4). It has a single-story shed roofed front porch with four columns on brick piers (photographs 4 and 5). The front (east) facade features a pedimented parapet, six-over-six double-hung-sash replacement windows, and an original front door with transom (photograph 4). The north façade and south façade are five bays with six-over-six double-hung-sash windows (photographs 2 and 3). The rear (west) façade is three bays with six-over-six double-hung-sash windows and a one-story addition on the southwest corner of the building (photograph 3). The exterior has three string courses (photograph 4).

The first floor contains the original sheriff's residence quarters, now divided into five offices. It has a central front door with parallel rooms flanking the entry vestibule (photographs 5 and 6) with the stairway rising from one office (photographs 8 and 9) to the second floor.

The second floor contains an original prefabricated jail works containing ten metal jail cells and two bathrooms/showers (photograph 12) with a wide central hall (photograph 10) and a side stairway. The jail works was made by Pauly Jailworks of St. Louis, a nationally known jail works builder and jail designer. Features of the jail works include the original metal stairway (photograph 9), pull-down metal bunk beds (photographs 11 and 13), metal doors (photographs 8, 10, and 11), and other builtin features.

There is a full basement. Original steam heat radiators survive. The grounds contain small yards on the front, sides and rear with a modern fence enclosing most of the sides and rear (photographs 1, 2, and 3). The only outbuilding is a nonhistoric 1950s garage built of concrete blocks (photograph 3).

Section 7--Description

Changes to the building from the 1996 renovations include window replacements, replastering some walls, upgrading the air-conditioning and electricity, and lowering the ceilings.

Section 8--Statement of Significance

# Statement of significance (areas of significance)

The Candler County Jail is significant in the area of architecture as a good and intact example of a building constructed to serve as a county jail and sheriff's residence. The two-story, brick building, constructed in 1916, retains its original porch, doors, residential floor, and on the upper floor, a prefabricated jail works by the Pauly Jail Building Company of St. Louis, a major jail-design firm. Characteristics of the Colonial Revival style featured on the building include the symmetrical facade. one-story front porch, stringcourses, and front door transom. Jails built during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20th centuries were constructed of fire-proof materials, in this case brick, which reflect the concern for safety not offered in earlier log and frame jails, and also a prosperity in developing counties. The architecture of these jails is expressive of the multi-purpose uses of a jail. In addition to housing prisoners, space in the building had to provide for the jailer's office, family living quarters, and cooking facilities. The overall concept was for the jailer and his family to be housed on the first floor with cooking also carried out on this level and the prisoners housed on the second floor. This building also represents the evolution of jail architecture from primitive buildings in the early to mid-19<sup>th</sup> century to buildings considered modern and up-to-date by the end of the century. Around 1880, there appeared to be more concern for the health of prisoners. New jails provided for prisoners to be housed on the second floor and wood cells were replaced with metal cells that allowed for better ventilation and light.

The Candler County Jail is also significant in the area of <u>politics and government</u> because it served as the county's only jail from 1916 until the 1970s as well as the residence for the county sheriff and his family, a system common to the early 20th century, but not usually found today. This jail reflects the county government system that developed in the state of Georgia. Along with county courthouses, jails represented law, order, and a sense of community. In most cases the construction of the jail followed the building of the courthouse. Jails also prompted cooperation between counties which was not possible though courthouse structures. Prior to construction of a permanent jail most counties utilized a facility in an adjacent county to house their prisoners. The loss of a jail through fire or deterioration would prompt the sharing of a nearby jail facility as well. Through this cooperative arrangement, jail design appears to have also been shared.

# **National Register Criteria**

The Candler County Jail is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A in the area of Politics and Government as the jail and sheriff's residence for Candler County and for the typical activities that occurred there during the historic period. It is also eligible for listing under Criterion C in the area of architecture as a good and intact example of a county jail facility with prefabricated jail works.

# Period of significance (justification)

The period of significance for the Candler County Jail begins c.1916, the construction date of the building, and ends in 1952, the end of the historic period.

# Contributing/Noncontributing Resources (explanation, if necessary)

Candler County Jail is the one contributing resource on the nominated property. A 1950s garage is the noncontributing resource on the nominated property.

# Developmental history/historic context (if appropriate)

The Candler County Jail was completed in 1916. The local firm of Fowler and Sage were awarded the construction contract of \$9,286. Other firms submitting bids included Roanoke Bridge and Iron Works at \$9,750 and Southers Structural Steel Co. at \$9,585. The specifications called for a fireproof brick building measuring 40' x 40' with living quarters for the sheriff on the first floor and 10 jail cells on the second floor. Pauley Jail Building Co. of St. Louis manufactured the cell equipment.

The historic Candler County Jail continued to serve in its original capacity until the 1970s when a new jail was constructed. Since that time, the facility has housed various county offices, including the current Emergency Management Office, as well as Code Enforcement, Victim's Assistance, and Magistrate Court.

The property received a Georgia Heritage grant in 2001 for development for a new roof.






