- 17. The huge Sibley's building is situated on the entire irregular block between Main Street, Clinton Avenue and Franklin Street.

 Across Clinton Avenue, Main Street and Franklin Street are other multi-story commercial buildings. An attached ten-story parking garage (non-contributin (1959) is directly behind the building. The building occupies a lot of 3.219 acres (source: City of Rochester tax maps).
- 18. The Sibley's building is a monumental Roman brick structure irregular in plan with a five-story western section (1904) and a twelve-story eastern section known as the Tower building (1911, 1924). Occupying an entire city block, it is a representative example of the early twentieth century Chicago style as interpreted by local architect J. Foster Warner. Granite trim on the first story storefront, a denticular cornice, and a Baroque clock tower rising three stories above the eastern section are the building's only decorative fetures. The tripartite organization of its fenestration is typical of the Chicago style.

The eastern section was the first to be built in 1904; the attached addition (present Tower building) was constructed in two phases: the first six stories completed in 1911, the upper six stories in 1924. The entire design was the work of J. Foster Warner.

The store has not been significantly altered on the exterior with the exception of the closing of the Main Street entrance. In the 1950s, an addition to the rear of the building (1918) was demolished. The interior of the building retains its original floor plan although original details and appointments are no longer extant.

20. The Sibley's building (1904-1924) is architecturally significant as an early twentieth century urban department store structure in Rochester executed in the Chicago style to the design of noted local architect J. Foster Warner. It is historically significant for its association with Sibley, Lindsay and Curr, Rochester's largest and most influential retail concern. The retail trade was a major force in Rochester's economy in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, and Sibley's was the apotheosis of that industry. Foster's use of the Chicago style in his design for the building and its major additions (1911, 1924) is unique to the thematic group; and its prominent location on East Main Street, where it remains essentially intact, renders it a significant landmark within the multiple resource area.

The firm of Sibley Lindsay and Curr was organized in 1868 by Rufus
A. Sibley, Alexander M. Lindsay and John Curr, all of whom came
to Rochester from Boston where they had met while working for
Hogg Brown and Taylor, a dry goods establishment. Although the
partners styled themselves as "Sibley Lindsay and Curr," the store
was known as the "Boston Store." Boston stores, a fixture on the
American retail scene for many years, were given their name

because Boston was the scene of the invention of the department store of the mid-nineteenth century. Sibley, Lindsay and Curr brought the Boston store to Rochester.

Sibley Lindsay & Curr began business in a store in the Marble Block adjoining the famous Osburn House hotel on East Main Street(on the site of the present Granite Building). Sibley's emphasized volume and price: it was the first major store in the area to mark all merchandise clearly, treating all customers alike. As contrasted with the drab, haphazard appearance of many of the older retailers, their establishment was bright, clear, and well lighted. They laid great emphasis on counter display and were quick to extend credit. They also developed a large wholesale business which catered to country stores throughout New York State, northern Pennsylvania and New England. With the wholesale business they also developed an unusual dry goods manufacturing business for which part of the Cox Building was constructed in 1888.

By 1893 the firm had outgrown its varied collection of buildings and had constructed the Granite Building on East Main Street and the large Cox Building warehouse for its wholesale business on St. Paul Street. The Wholesale and retail business of the firm was so extensive that it was obliged to maintain offices and buyers in New York City and four European cities. The Granite Building opened on October 23, 1893 and was only equalled in size and appointment by department stores in New York and Chicago. Proclaimed a fireproof building, the 'interior of the Granite Building was, nevertheless, consumed in the Great Sibley Fire of 1904, resulting in the loss of Sibley's retail space and warehouse.

Construction of the present building(228 East Main Street) was started in 1904 following the fire. In fact, the fire only accelerated the construction of the new store on a site which Sibleys already owned. Just 30 days after the fire, Sibleys reopened in the old Empire Theater Building at the northeast corner of East Main Street and Clinton Avenue and in adjoining older structures. Because of these new conditions, the present store was built in sections, with the Empire Theater and adjoining buildings used until the first new section was ready for occupancy. In 1905, the store moved into the ell-shaped five-story first section; by the fall of that year the entire new structure had been completed. The frontage on East Main Street was an impressive 360 feet and that on Clinton Avenue was more that 300 feet. The use of the stark and unadorned Chicago style, new to Rochester, was accentuated by the sheer massiveness of the new Sibley's Building.

In 1911 a major addition to the store was completed. This was the Mercantile Building, and it carried the store all the way east to North Street and Franklin Street. The store then comprised thirteen acres of floor space and employed 2,400 people at Christmas time. The Mercantile Building was six stories tall and in addition to more retail space, contained special areas for the still active wholesale division. This 1911 addition was designed by Warner in a style identical to that of the 1904 building.

The optimism of the 1920s and the remarkable prosperity of the business (in 1924) led to still another enlargement of the giant store building. Six floors were added to the Mercantile Building which resulted in the Sibley Tower Building of twelve stories. When completed, it was the largest office building in the city and dominated the central business district; with its commanding position at the downtown culmination of East Avenue. Unfortunately, its constructin coincided with the beginning of a real estate collapse in Rochester, and the Tower Building would not be commercially successful until the office space shortage which developed from World War II, nearly two decades later.

The building and all its additions were the fastidious work of J. Foster Warner, one of Rochester's most important architects of the period. Warner took particular care with the Sibley's building and its additions, and to him went the responsibility of overseeing its continuity of design. It was Warner's obsession that the joining of new construction to old be absolutely indiscernable in the Roman bricks and granite trim of the exterior as well as the columns, walls and floors of the interior.

In 1913 a five-story Achilles Street addition to the rear of the building consisted of new stables, garages and a power plant. In the Warner tradition, all were of the best polished granite. (This section was demolished in the 1950s for the present parking garade.) With the completion of the 1924 addition, the Sibley's building had overy twenty-three acres of floor space and was the largest retail store in the state outside of New York City.

It survives virtually unaltered since its completion as testament to the company that has cared for it for over 80 years and to the architect who designed it. Pride in the building is evident in the care with which all alterations are made, including the restoration of the original restaurant.

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

This letter is provided to notify you the current owner of the Sibley, Lindsay & Curr Building, commonly referred to as the Sibley Building, at 228 East Main Street in Rochester, NY wishes to have the Sibley Building listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Sibley Building received a Determination of Eligibility for listing on the National Register by the Keeper of the Register in 1984 when it was recommended for listing as part of the Department Store Group within the Inner Loop Multiple Resource Area. At that time, the owner objected to the listing. The Sibley Building was identified as a "DOE" on the Nomination and was not officially listed as part of the MRA due to owner objection.
