ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Gothic Revival-style house with Tshaped plan, asymmetric massing, 1-1/2 stories high, steep gable roof with dormers, centrally located chimney, bay window, front porch, and rear ell: constructed of wood frame, with board-and-batten siding, on a stuccoed masonry foundation; details include molded battens, scalloped bargeboards, dripstone-type windows and do rway surrounds, and a narrow, diamond-shaped attic vent; interior recently remodeled; prominently situated on a slight rise of ground at the end of a street north of downtown; grounds feature trees, shrubbery, lawn; and a low concrete retaining wall at the street; surrounded by non-historic residences on three sides, open land to north; good condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecturally, this is one of the finest Gothic Revival residences in Cave Spring. Although the interior has been remodeled, the exterior is virtually intact. Salient features include its plan, massing, and detailing; its design might well have been taken from a pattern book. Gothic Revival residences are relatively rare in Georgia, a state dominated by the Greek Revival, but they are well represented in the Cave Spring multiple-resource area. Because of its siting on a low rise at the end of a street, it has become a landmark in the downtown part of the city.
