A two-story house and lighthouse tower combined into one building made of cream colored brick. The house has a moderately steep gabled roof with a slight shallowing of pitch near the lower end of each face. At both gable ends, vertical ornamental posts or finials extend from the top level of the second story windows through the ridge of the roof and terminate in spires above the ridge. Near the lower end of each finial is a horizontal supporting crosspiece attached to the verge boards. Such gable end ornamentation, which gives the appearance of having a structural supporting function, is an interesting and attractive Gothic Revival architectural touch.

The lighthouse is a square structure oriented diagonally to the walls of the lightkeeper's house and built into the side of the house at the northeast end. There is a cast iron circular stairway leading from the basement of the lighthouse to the cupola, with landings at the floor levels of the house proper. At the second story landing is the only closet in the entire building. There is access to the house at each floor level. At the top of the tower is a square deck with an iron rail. The glazed cupola which houses the light is a decagonal structure set in the center of the deck. An alteration has been made in that the original oil burning, hand-operated light has been replaced by an electric, fully automatic light which needs no attendant except when the need for repairs or maintenance arises.

Near the back of the house is a massive square chimney oriented diagonally to correspond with the tower. This chimney arrangement makes it possible for more rooms to have stove chimney outlets at each floor level. There were stove openings in the parlor, dining room and kitchen downstairs and in a large bedroom upstairs.

The kitchen and dining room have wainscoted walls. (Fortunately, during the restoration, a nearby lumber company was found to have enough wainscoting still in storage from years past when it was occasionally in demand, to replace original parts of wainscoting where needed.) Because of the thickness of the walls of the house, window casings were set deep, giving extra depth to the sills.

The structure is original and was faithfully restored in 1961-1963. The original plans were available and used in making the structural restoration authentic. In order to preserve the original plaster, however, it was decided best to scrape off as much old calcimine and paint as possible and, after applying patching plaster where needed, to cover the walls with wallpaper appropriate to the period. This alteration and that of replacing the old wood shingles with more weather resistant asphalt shingling should be made a matter of record, although neither is considered to be of more than minor importance so far as taking away from the structure's integrity is concerned.
