Valmont Bergeron House, Pointe Coupee Parish, LA

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The Valmont Bergeron House (c. 1840) is a one story frame dwelling in the French Creole style. It is located in a rural, agricultural area of Pointe Coupee Parish facing Louisiana Highway 414. Despite some alteration, the home retains its National Register eligibility.

Creole features found in the Valmont Bergeron House include:

- 1) a Class III gabled roof,
- 2) a partially intact floorplan displaying unusual Creole geometry. The structure is three rooms wide, and its <u>salle</u> is located at one end of the building. This is contrary to the more usual Creole arrangement in which the <u>salle</u> is centered in the plan and flanked by <u>chambres</u>. Whether the house was originally built in this configuration or expanded from a two-room plan is uncertain. A full length front gallery and altered <u>cabinet</u>/loggia range (see below) complete the floorplan.
- an asymmetrical facade with openings which correspond to the internal arrangement of the rooms,
- 4) a pegged and mortised frame in which some members are hand hewn and others are pit sawn,
- 5) bousillage walls,
- 6) exposed beaded ceiling beams in the salle,
- 7) two surviving sets of French doors, each with three lights per leaf, and
- 8) two simple wraparound mantels.

Other interesting features found in the home include variable width ceiling planks in one room, original strap hinges on interior three batten single leaf doors, original solid wood gallery columns, and a low brick arch which serves as the foundation for two of the home's hearths and fireplaces. This feature is similar to foundation arches found in fully raised Creole plantation houses but is unusual in a building such as the Bergeron House, which stands low to the ground.

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The Bergergon House has experienced the following changes, most of which appear to date to a 1937 renovation:

- the loss of its Norman truss roof, chimneys, attic stairway, and one wraparound mantel,
- 2) the replacement of one set of French doors by a multi-pane single leaf door, the replacement of one <u>chambre</u>'s exposed beaded ceiling beams by plain exposed beams, the installation of two sets of double windows in one <u>cabinet</u> room, and the replacement of all the exterior siding,
- 3) the covering of the upper part of the gallery's colonnade with clapboards in an effort to create an entablature and the loss of the gallery's balustrade, and
- 4) changes to the <u>cabinet</u>/loggia range. These include the enclosure of the loggia to create a kitchen and bathroom, the addition of a small wing at the rear to accommodate a dining room and porch which connect to the kitchen, and the conversion of one <u>cabinet</u> into a laundry.

Although the loss of some original features is regrettable, the Valmont Bergeron House retains its identity as a Creole dwelling. Its massing, asymmetrical facade, two wraparound mantels, two French doors, <u>bousillage</u> walls, and the <u>salle</u>'s exposed beaded ceiling beams remain intact. While one door has been changed, the replacement door is in keeping with the architectural character of the house since it is derived from the single-leaf French door. Finally, the home's rear addition causes minimal visual impact and cannot be seen from the front. As an example of rare French Creole features in Pointe Coupee Parish, the Valmont Bergeron House is a viable candidate for National Register listing.

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The Valmont Bergeron House is locally significant in the area of architecture within the context of Pointe Coupee Parish because it is one of a select number of houses which illustrate rare and significant features of the Creole style.

Although Pointe Coupee Parish has long been recognized as an important area of early French settlement, time and changing tastes have eroded the parish's collection of significant Creole houses. The Louisiana Comprehensive Historic Structures Survey has identified 799 50+ year old buildings in the parish. Of these, 193 are in the Creole style and hence reflect, at least in a general sense, the French origins of the area. However, most of these buildings are Creole in plan and configuration only and lack other significant features associated with the style. Instead, they usually display Greek Revival, Victorian, or bungalow details. Of the 193 structures identified as Creole, only approximately twelve to fifteen retain enough integrity in their stylistic and construction features to justify their recognition as noteworthy examples of Creole architecture. Of this small group, approximately half represent the two story raised plantation house which was the apex of the Creole style, and half are in the form of the moderately-sized and small one-story Creole homes which would have been the norm in the early days of parish history. The Valmont Bergeron House is one of these moderate-sized dwellings.

Features present in the Valmont Bergeron House which are not found in the majority of Pointe Coupee's Creole homes include <u>bousillage</u> walls and a French timber frame which utilizes mortised and pegged members. The vast majority of Pointe Coupee Parish's Creole houses have plain frame walls with no infill. The home is also one of only nine in the parish known to contain French wraparound mantels. In addition, it retains interior exposed beaded ceiling beams in one room and all but one of its French doors.

Historical Note

Although the owners of the Valmont Bergeron House believe it to date to c. 1782, the available architectural evidence indicates that it was constructed around 1840. While associated most closely with Valmont Bergeron, the dwelling has been the residence of the Lopez family since 1937.
