Representation in Existing Surveys: Inventory of Historic Places in South Carolina, 1981

<u>Description</u>: Pinopolis Historic District North, which consists of seven properties, includes four of the nineteenth century retreats that helped to engender Pinopolis. The houses are uniformly of frame construction and abstain from the stylistic pretensions of the permanent planters' seats of the period in accord with their status as houses of retreat. The buildings in the district date from ca. 1834 to ca. 1883 and retain in large measure their original forms and features. The district is heavily wooded with pine trees and heavy undergrowth. No paved roads and no contemporary construction have yet assailed this part of Pinopolis.

<u>Significance</u>: Pinopolis Historic District North includes four of the early planters' retreats that characterized this pineland village. The district is unified by the absence of contemporary buildings, the heavy foliage, the absence of paved roads, and the cohesiveness of the four residences, which are uniformly of frame construction, weatherboarded, with large porches and few stylistic aspirations. The buildings are representative of nineteenth century vernacular forms and construction technology.

<u>Verbal Boundary Description</u>: The boundary of the Pinopolis Historic District North is shown as the red line on the accompanying Berkeley County Tax Map # 102-02-03, 102-02-04, sheet 1 of 2, drawn at a scale of 1 inch = 200 feet. This boundary includes the greatest number of historic buildings in this part of Pinopolis and the fewest nonhistoric intrusions.
