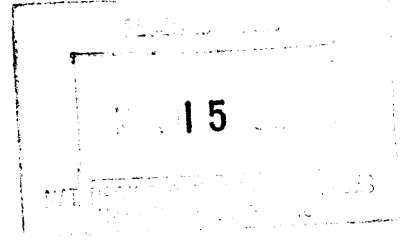

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The Salem Church Parsonage is located on South High Street in the City of Menno, South Dakota. The house is located in a thriving rural community, just blocks from the commercial core. The house is surrounded by both early and late 20th century structures. The house is an excellent example of the Queen Anne style.

Architectural Description

The Salem Church Parsonage, built circa 1913 is a two story, clapboard sided house with an asphalt shingle roof and a concrete and stucco foundation. The house exhibits characteristics of Queen Anne design which include: steeply pitched roof of irregular shape with dominant front-facing gable; gable returns; cutaway bay windows; asymmetrical facade with a full-width porch which is one story high and extended along one or both side walls.

The façade of the house has a partial width porch that wraps around to the south elevation. Six slender classical columns support a flat roof. Between the columns are turned spindles. The porch has an unornamented frieze. The same spindles enclose the second floor porch. At the northwest corner of the façade is a three-sided bay window. Each side had a one-over-one double hung window with thick trim boards. To the south of the bay window is an entry door. The bump out on the south elevation has a one-over-one double hung window on the façade. The second floor has fishscale siding, engaged columns on the corners and gable returns. To the north is a pair of one-over-one double hung windows. Adjacent to the windows is an entry door. The bump out on the second floor has a one-over-one double hung window. In the peak of the gable is a diamond shape window.

The south elevation has a bay window at the southwest corner with a one-over-one double hung window in each side. The bay window has a flat roof that extends over the bay. To the east of the bay is a cottage window with leaded glass in the upper sash. The second floor has a one-over-one double hung window and a fixed pane window. Located in the gable peak is a diamond shape window. The one-story enclosed porch that was historically associated with the house on the southeast end of the south elevation, has been extended to create an additional two feet of interior space. This addition has a bay window with four single paned windows and a single pane window at the southeast corner.

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The east elevation has an entry door at each corner. Located in the center is a fixed pane window. In the gable peak is a small, one-over-one double hung window. A three sided, gable roof, screened in sun-oom was added in 2000 to the northeast corner.

The north elevation has four evenly spaced one-over-one double hung windows on the first floor. The second floor has two one-over-one double hung windows. Located in the gable peak is a diamond shaped window.

Garage:

The garage is a two story, wood clapboard, gable roof building historically used as a carriage house. The gable ends of the building have a four paned fixed window on the first floor and in the gable peak. The north elevation has a four paned fixed window in the center of the elevation with new garage doors on either side that fit the historic openings.

The Salem Church Parsonage is significant under criterion C for the distinctive architectural style of Queen Anne. The Salem Church Parsonage, constructed in 1913 is a well-preserved example of the Queen Anne style in a rural community setting. The ornate home continues to provide a sense of architectural appeal that made it worthy of notice in 1913.

Immigrants from Germany settled the area of Menno, Hutchinson County in 1874. The county itself was settled in 1862 and began flourishing almost immediately. Traditional settlement houses made of sod sprang up across the county. Many of the settlers in Menno made their living from the land. They came to this area of South Dakota because it was reputed to have the richest, most fertile soil in the country. The town of Menno, though, owes its development to the railroad. In 1879, a branch of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul was formed, running diagonally across the county. Without the development of the railroad, the community of Menno surely would have failed.

The Salem Church was formed in 1882 when a minister from Russia came to serve the community. The Church structure was constructed in 1909. The church parsonage was constructed in 1912 and completed in 1913 at the cost of \$3,965.00. A garage was constructed in 1914. In the 1960's a new facility was constructed for the Salem church and the 1909 church destroyed.

The Queen Anne style was most popular from roughly 1880 through the turn of the century, although it did persist into the mid-1920's in South Dakota. The style is typified by irregular, steeply pitched roofs, asymmetrical facades and decorative elements to avoid flat walls. The Salem Church Parsonage is a typical representation of the Queen Anne style and the picturesque movement in architecture.

The house exhibits many of the characteristics associated with the Queen Anne style. It has the irregular roof shape, a full width porch, and fishscale shingles on the second floor. The house has had few alterations over time which include the repair of the front porch and a rear addition. It is also significant as many of the larger Queen Anne style homes in Menno have been destroyed.

The Salem Church Parsonage is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C, for its architectural value and significance in Menno, South Dakota. It is an excellent example of Queen Anne style homes in Hutchinson County.
