The original part of the building known as the Velasco House was apparently constructed some time in the 1850's according to tree ring specialists at the University of Arizona. They have dated the ceiling beams which they believe were added later to the main rooms and entry hall, probably around 1879 or 1880. The report of the Tree Ring Laboratory is attached.

The house was built in the manner typical of construction in Sonora and in Southern Arizona during the territorial period... That is with a central zaguán or entry hall and rooms radiating from a central courtyard. Originally the house was an L shape with two rooms and zaguán facing on Stone Avenue. The "L" projected to the east toward Russell Street. Eventually, six additional rooms were attached to the main structure creating a U-shaped building, but the date of the additions is not known. A separate building facing on Russell Street once served as residence for the Velasco family while the building facing Stone housed the print shop and offices.

All of the structures are of adobe construction. The original part of the "house" has ceilings of 14' to 15' high with beams of Douglas fir primarily, some of Ponderosa pine, while the beams above the doors are of hand cut mesquite. The ceiling construction is of saguaro ribs, grass and 18-24 inches of adobe above. Each of the original rooms, excluding zaguán, had a fireplace. The addition had two fireplaces but one is now closed.

The house is in fair condition now and has had a chainlink fence constructed around it by the City of Tucson to help prevent vandalism. However, since the building is standing vacant, deterioration is taking place. The owners appreciate the historic value of the house and wish to preserve it to the best of their ability.

The Velasco House derives its significance from several Physically, it is an excellent example of the regional architecture of the 19th century. Historically, it is one of the few remaining houses in Arizona associated with prominent Mexican-Americans of the territorial period. In addition, the Velasco house was the home of one of Arizona's first Spanish-language newspaper, El Fronterizo, which was published continuously until Velasco's death in 1914. Carlos Ygnacio Velasco (1837-1914) was a native of Hermosillo. Sonora and the son of prominent citizen of that state. In his home state Velasco had studied law and had at one time been a judge and a member of the legislature of Sonora, but his first career after coming to Arizona in 1865 was that of merchant. In 1878 Velasco sold his store and began his publishing career with the weekly El Fronterizo. The press which he purchased for this venture and installed in the Velasco house was the same press which had printed Arizona's first newspaper in 1859. El Fronterizo had a wide circulation in Sonora as well as

in Arizona. In 1889 Velasco branched out with a new paper, El Hijo del Fronterizo, published in Phoenix partly in Spanish and partly in English. After 1897 El Fronterizo was also bilingual. From 1897 to 1899, while Velasco was in partnership with Tucson Mayor Ben Heney, the paper was a daily, but after the partnership was dissolved, Velasco returned to the more profitable weekly edition. Velasco was well-known in Arizona and active in civic affairs. In 1894 he founded a highly successful fraternal insurance society, the Alianza Hispano-Americana. He was a friend of Ponficio Diaz and served for a time as Mexican Consul. The house was owned by the Velasco family from 1878, when it was purchased from R. Woffenden, until 1963. The present owners would like to restore the original building.
