

NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Walker House has many Prairie School features, including a hipped and gabled roof with Japanese-inspired wide flared eaves that are unusual in Kalispell, two windows with diamond-shaped panes in the wrap-around front porch, fluted square porch-support columns, a front bay window, a small dormer in the northeast corner, and a complex plan. The residence is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places because it is a well-preserved example of the eclectic residential architecture of Kalispell of the 1910s.

The roof is covered with composition shingles and the siding is narrow-reveal clapboard. There is a second-story rear addition with wider-reveal siding. The house sits on a concrete basement and has a central brick chimney.

An interior stairway leading from the kitchen may have been used by servants. The house has two upstairs bedrooms and one upstairs bathroom.

At the rear of the lot is a shallow-gabled one-car garage with a metal overhead door. The garage has T-111 siding and a roof covered with composition shingles. The 1927 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map shows a two-story garage along the alley, centered between the two lots the house originally sat on. There was also a smaller one-story garage to its north.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Walker House, built ca. 1910, is a large, well-preserved residence with a design that is very unusual in Kalispell. The 1½-story Prairie-style residence has a hipped and gabled roof with wide flared eaves. The slight flare to the wide overhanging eaves reflects the Japanese influence upon American Prairie School design. Other significant details that reflect the eclectic nature of the design include a small dormer in the northeast corner, two windows with diamond-shaped panes in the wrap-around front porch, fluted square porch supports, a front bay window, and a complex plan. The residence is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its architecture, which is unique in Kalispell of a Queen Anne-style residence with wide flared eaves. The significant date is ca. 1910, the year of construction. A rear addition does detract from the physical historical integrity of the house, but the residence retains sufficient overall integrity to be eligible for listing.

The first known occupant of the residence was Fred Walker, a house carpenter who was living here when the 1910 federal population census was taken. In 1909, he was living in the house to the south at 1138 1st Avenue West. He and his wife were from Wisconsin, and their son and Walker's brother-in-law lived with them. That same year, house carpenter Oren Prouty and his wife and daughter lived in a dwelling at the rear of the lot (that dwelling no longer exists). By 1911, Fred Walker and his family had moved to Eureka, but they owned the property from 1909 until 1913.

The next known occupant of the house was Hiram Wescott, a laborer who rented the dwelling from approximately 1915 until 1925. Wescott worked primarily as a timber cruiser, although when the 1920 census was taken he is listed as a lumberman for a mining company. Wescott was originally from Wisconsin and his wife Amy was from Michigan. In 1920 they had one son, Luell, living with them. The house was owned by Henry Hoffman from 1913 until 1934, but he apparently rented it out during that period and lived on 7th Avenue East North.

According to the Kalispell City Directories, other pre-World War II occupants of the residence included policeman Charles and Anna Ufford and Clarence and Neva Ufford (ca. 1928), Charles and Anna Ufford and music teacher Mrs. Ruth Riebe (ca. 1930), undersheriff Ray Bryan and his wife Ella (ca. 1934), and real estate agent Guy Kao (he owned the house from 1935 until 1942).
