

This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.



HISTORIC I LOCATION: Horn-Ackerman

Van Blarcom name is wrong in latest HABS listing. VAN HORN-ACKERMAN name is chosen as it is probable that the latter built the section nearest the road, and also the house stayed in that family for 48 years. According to Arthur W. Van Horn, the house may have been built by Cornelius Van Horn and title passed to Barent (Barney) Van Horn, his brother. Cornelius, Sr. and his wife, Sarah Blauvelt, were buried on the farm. Cornelius, Sr. children were born here as well as those of his son, Cornelius, Jr. According to Fred T. and Adelene Eckes, Theodorus Pulhameus acquired it in the early 1800's and sold it in 1813 to Daniel Tenure and Paul Van Houten. In 1865 son Garret sold it to his brother-in-law John DeBaun who sold it in 1866 to Robert Branford. In 1907, John Branford acquired it and owned it until the 1940's. Roy and Alice Lake owned it in 1948. Center section has frame end walls and south wing appears to be an addition, but closer inspection must be made. Original section of 1740's may be gone according to tradition. Large section has Federal feeling.
