Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

In 1919, Eng. Julio Conesa designed and constructed the wooden house located at 146 Reina Street in the city of Ponce for his friend Miguel C. Godreau. The structure was a wedding present for his young wife Leonina.

A central corridor divides the plan of the house into three parts and leads from the living room to the dining area, one of the most comfortable and important spaces of the house. Among the outstanding interior features are the paintings of the walls of the living room and corridor or marbleizing, which simulate marble and/or stone and completely mask the wooden surface on which they are painted. The chair rails throughout the house and the wainscot in the dining room are made of variegated woods. The original color scheme has been retained up to the present in all details, both inside and out, with only minor retouching. An asymmetrical wood divider or "mediopunto" articulates the living room space and plays a vital role in the spatial division of the house. Elaborate stained glass saloon doors provide privacy to the corridor when needed. Designed in geometrical patterns, these swinging doors act as the only physical, yet translucent, barrier between the semi-public and private areas of the house.

Other spaces in the house include four bedrooms, an office, four built-in closets, two comfortable bathrooms, a large kitchen and a pantry, all part of the original design. Some of these features emerge, in size and distribution as highly modern and sophisticated commodities, given the time in which the house was built. An "L" shaped balcony wraps around the S.E. corner of the house, another feature typical and repetitive in Ponce architecture.

The facades are simple yet elegant. A dark forest green color covers the wood siding; its windows and decorative elements are painted in white. Double-hung, translucent paneled windows are the main decorative features in the living room. Louvered doors and windows provide the ventilation to most of the other spaces. Roof vents are also main decorative elements of the facades.

Among the original structures still standing on the site are: the coach house, a children's playhouse, a charcoal storage structure, an orchidarium, a water tower with pump house, a gazebo and a concrete laundry wash basin. The property is delineated to the South by a low concrete wall with ornamental iron grille-work.

The only major feature altered is the roof covering of the balcony area, which in recent years was replaced by zinc when the original red, curved clay tiles deteriorated. The zinc roof is still painted red to simulate the tiles.

Mrs. Leonina Godreau still uses the house as her residence. Original furnishings and ornaments dating back to the inauguration of the house are still in use.

Unlike most of the architecture of early 20th century Ponce, which has Neo-classical influence, Casa Godreau stands out as one of the best examples of the changing design concepts of residential construction of that period. The three-part plan layout and organizing spatial sequence which commences with the living room and culminates with the dining room are typical of innumerable later examples. Architectural elements such as the asymmetrical "mediopunto" or wood divider, the stained glass saloon doors, and the marbleizing technique, painted by the local artist, Bertoli, make this residence significant. Its significance is augmented by the excellent state of preservation due to continued use and maintenance by its original owners.

In 1919, Miguel Godreau had his friend Eng. Julio Conesa Design and construct the wooden house located at 146 Reina Street in the City of Ponce. The structure was a wedding present for his young wife Leonina. The elegant, yet unpretentious, exterior of this house belies its interior distribution which is highly significant in terms of residential architecture in Ponce.

Built-in closets, comfortable bathrooms and a large kitchen part of the original design, emerge as highly "modern" and sophisticated commodities, given the time in which the house was built. An "L" shaped exterior balcony wraps around the S.E. corner of the house, anotherfeature typical of Ponce architecture.

MARBLEIZING: the use of antiquing techniques to achieve the appearance of marble in a paint film.


MARBLEIZED: having the appearance of marble, or made to look like marble by a special application of paint, as in marbleized woodwork.

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
