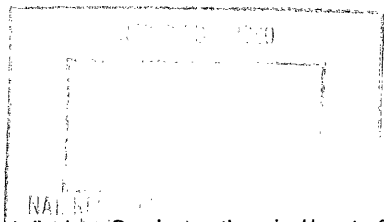

7. Description:

The J.J. Moore House (BO-186) is located in southern Boyle County, near the original alignment of the L&N Railroad in the community of Parksville. The one-and-one-half story, single family dwelling was constructed circa 1920 on a small tract of land along a major road leading from Danville to Parksville and is a notable example of the Bungalow style in Boyle County. Currently, the property includes two contributing buildings: the residence and an associated shed.

The **residence** (contributing building) sits near the roadside on a slight slope, fronted and partially shielded by two pine trees. Facing the main road (southeast), the one-and-one-half story, frame dwelling is built on an irregular plan and features a poured concrete foundation, full basement, original weatherboard siding with vertical corner board trim, and a low-pitched roof covered with asphalt shingles and pierced by four hip dormers - each facing one direction and all joined at the roof and eave in one low mass. The front, three-bay facade has a full porch beneath the extended roof, supported by square wood posts above a solid, geode-encrusted rail. The central entry door is of oak and features "Craftsman" details of wood and divided lights and is flanked by paired sash windows. Original windows are one-over-one, six-over-one, and nine-over-one with plain wood surrounds and sills, commonly found in pairs or sets of three along the each level. The connected hip dormers extend from the center of each second story facade with triple sash windows and weatherboard siding. An original one-story, one-bay wing on the east side wall has triple windows on each elevation. Locally found geodes also decorate a central interior chimney. Across the rear is a recently-built wood deck, entered through a first story rear door and supported by square posts.

The interior of the residence was not available for survey, however, exterior arrangements and fenestration patterns indicate a typical bungalow interior space with non-symmetrical room placement.

Behind (northeast) of the residence is a **pre-World War II frame shed** (contributing building) with a standing seam metal clad, side gable roof. Covered with vertical board siding, the resource was constructed around the same time as the main residence and features an entry on the front (south) facade. The building is and was used for storage.

8. Statement of Significance:

Located near the railroad community of Parksville in southern Boyle County, the J.J. Moore House (BO-186) is nominated as part of a Multiple Property Listing, "Historic and Architectural Resources of Boyle County, KY" and is significant within the context of "Domestic Architecture in Boyle County, KY, 1918-1945". The property is nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C, as a locally important example of the Arts and Crafts-inspired Bungalow style of the early-twentieth century. Because of its exceptional integrity of design and materials, it is an important example of the property type. The period of significance for the dwelling is circa 1920, the approximate date of construction by J.J. Moore.

J.J. Moore purchased the property in 1916 and deed research indicates that the main residence was constructed by 1927 when Moore acquired a tract adjacent to the property (Boyle County Deed Book 7; page 11). The construction date of the dwelling is consistent with Gibson Worsham's 1991 assertion that the Bungalow style did not become popular in Boyle County until the 1920s and 1930s (Worsham, 1991). The location of the bungalow at the northern edge of Parksville maintains the county pattern that suggests Bungalow-style resources were built most frequently in and near railroad communities. Through excellent retention of historic integrity, the property meets Registration Requirements established in the Multiple Property Form.

Verbal Boundary Description:

The nominated property is the domestic lot, including a main residence and outbuildings, on the northwest corner of State Routes 34 and 1822, near Parksville, KY. The property is indicated within the dotted lines of Parcel 1 on the accompanying Boyle County Identification Map 30. Located in the Boyle County Property Valuation Assessor's Office, the map has a scale of 1" = 600'.

Boundary Justification:

The boundaries of the nominated property include the main residence, buildings and sites historically associated with the J.J. Moore House and maintaining good historic integrity. Associated acreage remaining in Parcel 1 is not included.
