DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (II known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Perkins property consists of a two-story house, log cabin and small garage. It is situated on two acres of land settled in 1870 by one of the two founders of Colfax, James A. Perkins. The other man was T. J. Smith.

The house, including porches and balconies, measures about 50' X 60' and has five rooms downstairs and four upstairs, plus a bathroom on each floor. There is no finished attic and the basement contains only two small fruit rooms with dirt floors. (what, in the midwest, is referred to as a "Michigan basement")

The exterior of the house, as well as the inside, appear to be exactly as when built in the  $\underline{\text{mid-1880's}}$ . Both are very ornate and bespeak a Victorian elegance.

Inside are found rooms with 12' high ceilings, several of which appear to have the original wall coverings. Downstairs, there is a parlour, living room with a large fireplace, dining room, kitchen and bath. Upstairs, are four large bedrooms with a bathroom. A broad stairway with a wide balustrade leads from the first floor to the second and arises in a wide hall or vestibule.

Hardware on the doors, including the hinges, are of brass and very ornate.

Behind the house is a log cabin and shed combination which measures about 30' X 25'. The log cabin has been covered with siding which has served to preserve the structure. The logs appear to be very sound. Attached to the back of the cabin is a shed which appears to have been built about 1920 and served as a full storage area. The two structures have a roof in common.

A small frame garage (15' X 20') on the north side of the property completed the structures on this site.

The eastern and northern margins of the property are bounded by a low stone fence which at one time was surmounted by ornate cast iron grillwork. A small portion of this metal work has been preserved by the present owner.

There are a large number of trees, deciduous and coniferous on the property. A number of the pines exceed four feet in diameter.

The Perkins property was settled in 1870 by James A. Perkins, one of the two original founders of the town of Colfax and it was Perkins who built the first house in Colfax. It is stated by the old families in Colfax that the log cabin on the Perkins property was built in 1870 and is that first house. The main house was built in the mid-1880's and is a rare remnant of a period of elegance in early western American History. As the log cabin and house have undergone little modification since they were constructed, they constitute valuable historic treasures which warrant preservation.

In addition to Mr. Perkins' position as a founder of Colfax, the County seat of Whitman County, it is the architecture of the residence and the original log cabin which possess the significance of this historic resource. Each side of the house has a balcony and features certain details in the woodwork which are unique to each side of the building, thus presenting One of the particularly a different appearance from each view. distinctive features is the method of simulating masonry corners. From a distance, it is easy to mistake this frame structure The eaves are decorated with a simple for brick construction. wooden loop design while gable cornices feature a step pattern with elaborate scroll work supports. Windows have rounded corners and at one time had inside shutters. Inside, the house features sliding doors, arched doorways, twelve-foot ceilings, transoms of different colored glass, and careful detailing of the woodwork. The one obvious change to the interior is the modernization of the fireplace front.

Mr. Perkins played a founding role in the development of this farming community some 60 miles south of present Spokane. Settlement in Colfax was, in fact, prior to that of Spokane.

Perkins was one of a relatively small group of men to initially try farming in the Palouse Country of Eastern Washington. The Palouse soon proved to possess one of the richest soils in the world, comparing favorably with sections of China which have been productive for hundreds of years. Later, James Perkins engaged in banking and commerce in Colfax which grew to be the
