STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

The Wynn House was built by Colonel William L. Wynn, one of Columbus' earliest and most prominent residents. Located in the Wynnton section (named for Colonel Wynn), the large estate was situated east of the original city. Colonel Wynn was active in government, educational, social and religious affairs in Columbus. He served as a representative to the State Legislature in 1832, was a co-founder of the Wynnton Academies, and was a Methodist minister. His home was often the scene of large social gatherings.

The second owner of the estate, Henry Hurt, was a bachelor who never lived there. Tradition has it that he was engaged to be married, but that the marriage never took place.

In 1855, the house and grounds were sold to Colonel Hines Holt for \$14,000. Colonel Holt was a distinguished attorney and statesman. He served as City Attorney in 1843, and as a delegate to the Milledgeville Convention in 1861, where the decision to secede from the Union was made (Colonel Holt voted against secession). He also served as a representative to the Confederate Congress. After the War-Between-the-States, he was elected as a delegate from Columbus to serve Georgia during the Reconstruction Period.

Colonel Holt was well remembered by Columbus citizens for his rousing oratory on the occasion of Henry Clay's visit to Columbus during his presidential campaign. Holt delivered the welcoming address, "a long speech, to which he (Mr. Clay) eloquently replied."

The Holt family retained the home until Tom Cooper bought it early in the 20th Century. During the time Mr. Cooper owned the house, it was moved 300 feet by mulepower. Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Butler bought it in the late 1920's, and lived there until the late 1950's when the Christian Fellowship Association purchased it for their headquarters following a short period of ownership by James Waldo Woodruff, Jr.

As the Christian Fellowship Association it serves the community as a non-profit institution offering educational and (continued)

As stated above, this house is located in the Wynnton section. As is true of several areas of Columbus, the existing subdivision is named from the original "Great House" in the area. Wynnton is one of Columbus' most prominent sections, and The Wynn House dominates this neighborhood. Though there are several Greek Revival structures in Columbus, this house is of prime importance because of its history as well as its present-day function.

According to a recently passed Columbus zoning ordinance, any house accepted by the National Register will be given a "Landmark Status" locally. This means that all alterations, improvements, partial demolitions, et cetra, will be subject to review by the local Board of Historic and Architectural Review. This is of prime importance to The Wynn House, as it is situated on a United States Highway (U.S. 80), which is zoned for commercial uses.

Every protection must be given this beautifully sited, really distinctive Greek Revival period house.
