### **Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance**

Located on a sloping site at the northeast corner of Adams Avenue and Pierce Street in Eveleth, the Park Hotel is a three story brick structure on a rubble stone foundation. It is executed on an "L" plan, the interior of the "L" facing the alley to the rear. Aside from the simple corbelled cornice, the yellow brick structure is nearly without architectural embellishment. A one-story wrap around porch with square columns and turned spindlework balustrade leads to the principal entrance to the combination lobby and former Interurban Railway Depot.

The Park Hotel continues to function as a hotel, although more residential than transient. Original windows have been replaced with modern sash.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Park Hotel, a substantial hotel structure in Eveleth, was chosen as one of the major depots in the early Interurban Railway System. This system was a part of the Mesaba Railway Company that operated on the Iron Range from 1912 to 1927. Its tracks extended from Hibbing on the west to Gilbert on the east. It was the first and last mass transit system in the iron mining region. Although unrelated to the actual mining operation, the railway was developed in response to the needs of merchants in the large Range communities of Hibbing, Virginia, Eveleth, and Gilbert to provide an inexpensive means of transportation. Of the many systems resulting from great speculation in rail transit in the United States during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the Iron Range system was one of the larger experiments. The development of the automobile along with diminishing economic returns brought about the demise of the Interurban Railway System.

The hotel is significant, therefore, both as a historically important hotel and as a depot in an important early transit system.

Add to Description:

In addition to window replacement, the principal alterations to the exterior of the Park Hotel have been to the porch structure. These include replacement of the stone supporting piers and turned columns with square wooden posts, the removal of the second story balustrade, and the relocation of the central entry staircase to a corner position.

Add to Significance:

Change date from c. 1900 to 1904.

The Park Hotel, originally known as the Hotel Glode (for its proprietor, John Glode) was considered in its first years of operation the leading hostelry on the Mesaba Iron Range. For its period, the hotel was modern in its appointments, providing parlors, reading and writing rooms, sample rooms, seventy guest rooms, and large dining room, all with steam heat and electricity. It was the scene of major meetings and conferences and gained a reputation as a prominent resort hotel for tourists. It played a critical role in the early commercial life of the Mesaba Range by serving as a hotel for salesmen and a base from which they could promote and sell their products. Its location on one of the highest points of the city made it a prominent architectural feature in the community.
