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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

When Wilson Lumpkin considered the building of his house, he felt that to suit himself it must be an original house and one which would express his inward idea of life in its social and domestic aspect. Feeling that it would be impossible for an architect to design a house suitable to his desires, Lumpkin prepared his own design and followed every detail of its construction with the utmost care, maintaining careful records of its progress. He would accept only skilled workmanship. The stone work was done by Edward Lilley of Ireland, the wood work by David Demorist of New Jersey, the painting by C. G. Oliver of England, and the plastering by a Mr. Williams of New York City.

This was a very personal house as described in Lumpkin's words,"I have endeavored to put a piece of my character in its stone walls." Lumpkin explained his philosophy, "...and until this building falls down, or is destroyed, there I stand to be praised, or lampooned, as the work may be thought, to be good or bad, by the beholder. And although for a time, I may be exalted or despised, by ignorance and stupidity, I feel that time will award the verdict of truth, and by my own works, I shall be judged by posterity."

Upon the death of Lumpkin, the house passed to his daughter, Mrs. Martha Atalanta Lumpkin Compton. It was for Mrs. Compton that Atlanta was first named Marthasville and some contend that when the name was changed she still remained the namesake.

As the University grew, Mrs. Compton gradually sold her property until only the house and a few acres remained. Later, she reluctantly sold the house to the University in 1907 with a provision in the deed that if the house, symbolic of her father's personality, were ever removed from the premises, or destroyed manually, the penalty would be the reversion of the title of the property to her heirs.

Lumpkin House, protected, has continued to stand while it has been surrounded by the University's Science Center and other buildings. Used in the past as a dormitory, classrooms, a branch library, and a computer center, it is now the headquarters of the Institute of Ecology, whose members refer to it as the "Rock House." It is an architectural reflection of a notable Georgian, Indian Commissioner, Congressman and Governor (1831-1835).

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
