Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Augusta United States Post Office (c. 1938-1939) is located at 119 E. Fifth Street in Augusta, Butler County, Kansas (pop. 6,968). The one-story, ridge hipped roof, red brick building has a northern facade orientation. The building measures approximately sixty-one feet from east to west and sixty-six feet from north to south. A double door pierces the center of the building's facade. Steps lead up to the doorway. Two pairs of large, double hung windows surmounted by plain brick lintels and underscored by limestone sills flank the doorway. Six windows with similar treatment pierce the east and west elevations of the building. This post office is an example of a smaller class C or D standardized design type\_ that was repeated throughout the country during the 1930s.

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The mural "A Kansas Gusher" was installed on the west wall of the Augusta Post Office lobby above the postmaster's door and the two bulletin boards which flank it. This is the traditional location for Section artwork in the smaller class C and D post offices. "A Kansas Gusher" is an oil on canvas mural of a south central Kansas landscape that combines cattle and wheat in the foreground with an oil gusher on the horizon, representing the region's three economies. Silks divides the landscape by color groups of greens, golds, and browns. The cattle and the rancher are placed on the left half of the canvas on a green field, a row of sunflowers divides the canvas. The wheat farmers are placed on the right half of the canvas on a brown and gold field. The colors merge into light browns and golds as the land meets the sky. All activity in the mural is oriented toward the gusher. The mural measured 13' 4" x 4' 6" before installation and is enframed with a small moulding.

The mural was installed on February 28, 1940. It was not varnished. The treatment recommended for cleaning by the artist called for dusting monthly with a soft brush or cloth and cleaning thoroughly with an art-gum eraser every six to twelve months. Liquid cleaners were not recommended. In August, 1973 the mural's condition was assessed as good. In 1985, Scott Heffly, Assistant Curator at the Nelson Atkins Museum in Kansas City, Missouri cleaned and restored the mural. It is in good condition. 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A varnished, wooden vestibule projects into the lobby, cutting off some view of the mural. This is a traditional design feature found in most of the post offices included in this nomination. The floors and wainscotting retain their original tiles. The post master's door and bulletin boards retain their varnished wood surrounds. The varnished wooden panelling is retained in the post office ell where the boxes are located. The original hanging light fixtures have been replaced with almost flush mounted fluorescent lights. United States Department of the interior National Park Service

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or whether the award was made on the basis of previous submissions. Silks did enter the 48 State Competition in 1939. Silks received the contract for the mural on July 1, 1939 and the mural was installed on February 28, 1940. "A Kansas Gusher" was installed on the west wall of the lobby above the postmaster's door and the two bulletin boards that flank it. It measured 13' 4" x 4' 6" before installation and has a small moulding frame around it. Silks received \$670 for the commission. The Augusta Post Office is an example of one of the many smaller class C or D type post offices that received \$ection artwork in Kansas.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Augusta United States Post Office (c. 1938-1939) is being nominated to the National Register as part of the Kansas Post Office Artwork (1936-1942) Thematic Resources nomination at the local and state levels of significance under criteria A and C for its historical association with the Treasury Department's Section program and for the artistic significance of the mural that it contains. The mural, "A Kansas Gusher", was painted by Kansas City, Missouri artist Donald Kirk Silks (1912-?) in 1940. Because the mural is less than fifty years old, criteria consideration G, which allows for exceptional significance in the case of properties achieving significance within the past fifty years, is also a factor. The National Register has identified post offices containing Section artwork as being exceptionally significant if they retain integrity from their period of significance.

"A Kansas Gusher" is an oil on canvas mural of a south central Kansas landscape that combines cattle and wheat in the foreground with an oil gusher on the horizon, representing the region's three economies. Silks divides the landscape by color groups of greens, golds, and browns. The cattle and the rancher are placed on the left half of the canvas on a green field, a row of sunflowers divides the canvas. The wheat farmers are placed on the right half of the canvas on a brown and gold field. The colors merge into light browns and golds as the land meets the sky. All activity in the mural is oriented toward the gusher. Silks employs an illustrative, naive style to depict this representation of the Augusta/Butler County economy. "A Kansas Gusher" is representative of the regional, illustrative realism that was funded under the Section program.

The extent of community involvement in the development of the subject material and presentation of the mural is not clear in the Augusta case, nor is it clear whether Silks received the commission as a result of a competition held explicitly for the Augusta United States Post Office United States Department of the Interior National Park Service
