The Verendrye Plate is the first permanent record found of the first white men in Dakota Territory. These men led the way for further exploration and eventual development of the northwestern United States. It was placed by the Chevalier de la Verendrye on a hill near the present town of Pierre, South Dakota; the date was March 30, 1743. La Verendrye and his brother, Louis, headed a small party of Frenchmen seeking a route to the Pacific Ocean.

Although significant to the history of early exploration in the Upper and Great Plains, the Verendryes left little in the way of accurate accounts of their wanderings. Prior to the discovery of the lead plate, historians tried without success to identify landmarks and Indian tribes mentioned in the La Verendrye journals. Proof that they were in the Pierre area when the plate was buried clarified many of those references.

The La Verendryes never found the western ocean they searched for, but they did discover the Red River of the North, the Assiniboine and Mouse Rivers and much of the western Dakotas--including the Black Hills. Their narratives encouraged others to explore further west.

The plate with which the explorers laid claim to the upper Missouri for France was given to Pierre La Verendrye (the Chevalier's father) by King Louis XV. Pierre's sons placed it at the summit of a high bluff overlooking the Missouri River where it laid for 170 years. In 1913, it was discovered by some school children on an outing near Pierre. Early settlers testified that a mound of boulders once stood on the site, which corresponded with La Verendrye's statement that he piled rocks in a pyramid above the buried plate.

The present marker was erected in 1933; the plate itself is in the possession of the State Historical Society.
