ridge line on the north and south roof planes. Both the roof and gables are finished with wood shingles. A two story veranda extends across the front of the building. A similar feature on the rear has been enclosed. Access to the porches are by central doorways; double hung windows flank each door. Detailing throughout is simple.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in 1910 by contractor Ben DeCorse for Mrs. Jennie Fredley, the Fredley Apartments is a well preserved example of an early 20th century rooming house in Yuma. A number of similar structures were built about the same time to accommodate the influx of people brought in by Yuma's expanding agricultural base. The buildings were typically simple in design and ornamentation. They reflect the common tendency of the period toward horizontality and symmetry. In fact the formal features of the front facade are strongly suggestive of the Neo-Colonial Style in its Georgian Revival form, albeit without classical detailing. The Fredley Apartments is the best of its type built in the community
