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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ballestone Mansion, located on Cedar Point between Back and Middle Rivers in Essex, Baltimore County, Maryland, is presently a part of the Rocky Point Park and is owned by Baltimore County. The house, built during the late eighteenth or early nineteenth century, has been enlarged twice. The original portion was of two floors each measuring 20.2 feet by 17.5 feet or approximately 350 square feet per floor. A major addition of one floor was built adjacent to the northwestern gabled end. Being 20.6 feet by 24.6 feet, this increased the first floor by 506 square feet. It appears that the Miller family increased the total floor area to about 1,362 square feet circa 1870-80 by placing a second story above the addition.

The original, three-bay portion of the house, and all of its additions are brick except for a concrete block shed attached to the rear of the oldest part. The brickwork is of no distinct type on any elevation. At the second floor level of the northwest elevation, each four rows of stretchers are separated by a row of alternating header-stretcher-header. Mostly common bond is found on the southwest with a few rows of headers. A modern wall of common bond has been recently attached to the 1870 addition. Both gable ends possess a series of rows of stretchers, usually seven on the northwest and five on the southeast, which are separated by a single row of headers. Sometimes rows of stretchers of random lengths can be found incorporated within the northwest brickwork. New brick sills are present on both gable ends, but there are wooden sills on the other facades.

Characteristic of the eighteenth century, the original roof had a pitch of more than 45°. The original rafters were lapped at the ridge and pinned together with pegs. Collars held them with a dovetail joint. The attic was never plastered. When the second floor and two-story porch were added circa 1870-80, the roof pitch toward the front was diminished significantly so as to form a roof for the porch. The cornice of the new full-length porch has an Ogee cove molding, saw tooth dentils and squared brackets. Three dormers were also included in the Victorian expansion.

The first floor plan of this house consists of a center hall and stair with two large rooms on either side. On the second level, there is one bedroom to the left of the stair and two interconnected rooms to the right, but the partition dividing the latter is recent. A mahogany stairway which was in the central hall has recently been removed.

The front entrance in the third bay from the left is an opening of 5 feet 4 inches, including a full width transom light and two raised panels below. When the door was enlarged, an original jack arch was removed and the space covered by a framing member of the second floor porch. S

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Back River Neck in Baltimore County, situated between Back River to the south and Middle River to the north, was a rural district populated mainly by farmers in the nineteenth century. Today, just across the river from the Baltimore Beltway, it is becoming increasingly Ballestone Mansion is one of the few farmsuburban. related buildings to have survived in this area of rapid twentieth-century development.

Ballestone has had a long life full of alterations. Although part of it was built circa 1800, little of this now remains and the house as it stands today is illustrative of the large farmhouses of the 1870's and 80's. Restonation to and furnishings of this period, now planned by the Essex-Middle River Bi-Centennial Committee, will preserve Ballestone as a reminder of the life of that time. Most importantly, it will be an example made accessible to the public by its location in county-owned Rocky Point Park.

The history of the land called Ballestone/is entangled in the complicated relationships of the Stansbury family. In 1659, 420 acres of Ballestone were patented to William Ball of Virginia, great-grandfather of George Washington. This land was sold to Major Thomas Long, High Sheriff of Baltimore County, in 1678. When he died, it was inherited by his grandson, John Long, who sold it in three parts to Thomas Sheredine, Joseph Ward, and Stephen Body. Ward's and Body's tracts came into the Stansbury family in the middle of the eighteenth century, and it is on the latter parcel of land that Ballestone Mansion stands.¹

Stephen Body, who married Susannah Long, bought 170 acres of Ballestone in 1733. At his death eleven years later, he left this, which he called "my dwelling plantation" to his son Alanson Body and his personalty to his daughter 11

Penelope, wife of Dixon Stansbury. Elizabeth Body, Stephen's wife, paid the quitrent on this property in 1768. In 1776, Dixon Stansbury obtained a warrant to survey Ballestone's Support, an adjoining small tract which runs between the present house and Back River. Then in 1783, he paid taxes on both this and the Body portion of Ballestone, suggesting that Alanson Body had died and Stansbury was farming the land for his mother-in-law. It is possible that he built a small house at this time which has since been incorporated into the present Ballestone Mansion.²

This Body-Stansbury parcel of Ballestone was again divided in 1786, this time between John Watts, Stephen Body's grandson, and Penelope Stansbury, his daughter. Mrs. Stansbury's portion was granted to her daughter, Elizabeth Slade, in 1796. Mrs. Slade also inherited Ballestone's Support with her father Dixon Stansbury's death in 1805. Records after this time become obscured, but it is possible that Elizabeth and her husband William Slade owned this part of Ballestone for a good many years and that they made many of the initial changes in the house.³

Much land was sold for taxes in the lower part of Back River Neck in the first half of the nineteenth century. This was the case with the part of Ballestone which descended through Joseph Ward and was probably also true of the part belonging to the Body's and Stansbury's. Edward Miller obtained the property in 1855, and it was during his ownership that the alterations giving the house its present form were made. The house and surrounding lands were sold by Miller's heirs in 1969 to the Baltimore County Department of Recreation and Parks, to become Rocky Point Park.
