Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Moses Bailey House is a "connected farmhouse" grouping consisting of a $2\frac{1}{2}$ story gable-roofed main house, a side-ell with three distinct components, and a connected gable-roofed barn. A small one-story hipped-roofed ell also projects from the rear of the main section. Each section is timber-framed and sided with clapboards.

The plan of the main section is typical of nineteenth-century Maine farmhouses, with a central stair-hall, parlor and sitting room to either side, and dining room in the right rear corner. The parlor is a double room with sliding wooden doors between, and occupies the entire south side of the main section. The ell contains two stairways, one of them semi-circular.

When originally constructed, the house was ornamented in the Greek Revival style, with entablature, corner pilasters, and a simple square-pillared portico. An Italianate cupola, along with a two-story bay window on the south side were probably added in the 1870s. A bay window above the portico on the facade, along with a wide pointed gable and small round window may or may not have been added. The house retains most of its original 6/6 windows, only those of the parlor having been changed in the late Victorian remodelling.

Also on the property is a nineteenth-century letached barn with ornamental cupola, which does contribute to the farmhouse grouping, and two early twentieth century farm-related buildings which do not.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Moses Bailey House is a well-preserved 1850s "gentlemen farmer's" house. The building's massing and plan are traditional, and the exterior is decorated in the Greek Revival style, with a later high-style Italianate cupola. It is among the best extant mid-19th-century houses in Winthrop.

Moses Bailey (1817-1882), first with his father Ezekial and brother David, then with his brother Charles, was a principal in the pioneering Bailey family oil-cloth business. The Baileys were probably the first firm in the United States to produce and sell oil-cloth floor coverings (c. 1842), a standard item in 19<u>th</u>-century houses. Moses was briefly the sole owner of the business in the mid-1840s, but in 1847 was forced to sell out to his younger brother Charles, whom tradition credits with being the sharpest and most articulate of the brothers. Moses soon opened a new oil-cloth factory, however, directly across from the present house-site. This, too, was eventually bought out by his brother in the mid to late 1870s. Charles M. Bailey who lived two properties south of Moses (still standing, but unsympathetically altered), went on to become one of the largest oil-cloth manufacturers in the nation, with plants at Baileyville Winthrop Village and Skowhegan.
