## NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

The Farlow Hill Historic District possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. It is significant as a reflection of the high end of Newton's early 20th century, suburban growth. With its finely crafted commodious houses and sensitively laid out road system, it is one of Newton's finest residential areas. The Farlow Hill Historic District meets criteria A & C of the NRHP.

## ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other areas within the community.

The Farlow Hill Historic District, one of Newton's finest residential areas, is located in easternmost Newton Corner adjacent to the Boston/Brighton line. Roughly bounded by Franklin Street (N), Chamberlain Road (E), Huntington Road and Kenrick Street (S), and Waverley Avenue (W), it contains 37 commodious houses. Many of these houses are architect designed in fully developed interpretations of the Craftsman, Colonial Revival and Tudor Revival styles. They are generally constructed of the finest materials and are enhanced by large well-landscaped lots. The area is further distinguished by its road system which is laid out in a curvilinear pattern following the contours of Farlow Hill. Many of the houses are provided with panoramic views of the surrounding country side.

## HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain historical importance of area and how the area relates to the development of other areas of the community.

Newton Corner businessman and philanthropist John Farlow lived on Farlow Hill during the last quarter of the nineteenth century. He gave the land for Farlow Park on Centre Street (NR: 9/4/86) and the original memorial chapel at the Newton Cemetery, which was dedicated to Henry Bigelow. After his death in the mid-nineties, Farlow's beautifully landscaped, forty acre estate was subdivided by a syndicate represented by Henry E. Bothfeld, Frank A Day and G. Fred Simpson. Plans were drawn by the engineering firm of Aspinwall and Lincoln and the following description of the benefits of the area was printed in *The Newton Graphic* in 1907: "Well built public roads, with sewer, water, gas and electric light; a great variety of shade and ornamental trees, many of which are rarely found in New England; commanding sites, possessing unsurpassed outlooks; and long term restrictions as to cost, use and location of houses, are features of this easily accessible and unsurpassed development, which constitutes Newton's choicest residential section."

**ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (cont.)**

Representative dwellings from the Farlow Hill Historic District are described below:

Many excellent and varied examples of the Craftsman style are found in the area. A subtly well detailed Craftsman house is **88 Farlow Road** (1917). It is a two story stucco clad structure enclosed by a hip roof with eyebrow dormer. Its symmetrical facade is centered on an entry with half-length sidelights and a massive curving hood whose profile is repeated at the roofline over the outer paired windows. The entry is flanked by four part bay windows containing 6/1 sash and is headed by four narrow windows containing 4/1 sash. A very different interpretation of the style is provided by **106 Shornecliffe Road** (1911) which is a two story shingled house enclosed by a hip roof with exposed rafter ends. Its basically symmetrical facade is centered on an entry with classical surround consisting of sidelights and an elliptical fan. It is protected by a somewhat incongruous yet harmonious pergola porch. It is flanked by two window to the left and a triple window to the right. Three evenly spaced windows light the second story. Embraced under the same encompassing hip roof is an elegant two story sunporch characterized by large segmental arched openings glazed with multi-pane sash. A massive shingled example of the style with rustic stone entry porch is located at **12 Beechcroft Road** (1905). A large estate quality stuccoed Craftsman house with triple facade gables and banks of windows accompanied by a matching garage is located on an exceptionally large lot **85 Farlow Road** (c1905).

High quality Colonial Revival style houses abound in the area. Some predate the survey period such as **151 Franklin Street** (1900), **169 Franklin Street** (1901), **15 Farlow Road** (1904), **32 Farlow Road** (1902), and **56 Farlow Road** (1903). The house with monumental pedimented front at **32 Farlow Road** was listed in the National Register on 9/4/86. A few later examples exist as well such as **25 Beechcroft Road** (1961). The majority however date from the 1907-1950 period and are generally the more elaborate two story expressions of the style rather than the 1 1/2 story cottage forms such as Capes and Dutch Colonials. One exceptionally well detailed example of the style is **114 Farlow Road** (1910). The 2 1/2 story clapboard clad structure<sup>is</sup> enclosed by a slate gable roof with three pedimented dormers across the front slope. It is trimmed with corner quoins and a modillion cornice. Its symmetrical five bay facade is focused on an entry headed by a round arched fan and framed by engaged columns carrying a curved lintel shelf. A two story wing extends to the right and a handsome wooden picket fence sets the property off from the street. Another similarly well detailed example is **78 Farlow Road** (1910). This 2 1/2 story house has an exceptionally broad five bay facade and is

enclosed by a slate gable roof with three pedimented dormers across the front slope. The facade is clapboard clad while the side elevations are brick and incorporate massive bridged chimneys. The center entry is framed by sidelights and an elliptical fan as well as a broad pediment carried on pilasters. Windows are headed by lintels and contain 6/6 sash.

The Tudor Revival style is less well represented in the area than either the Craftsman or Colonial Revival styles. One example that pre-dated the survey period is **37 Beechcroft Road** (1903). It is a two story buff brick structure enclosed by a slate gable roof. Two facade gables, one with an oriel window, distinguish the rather stark and asymmetrical facade. Extending across most of the facade is a one story porch whose entrance is defined by a gable with carved bargeboards. A more typical example of the style is **55 Farlow Road** (1922). This two story stucco clad house is enclosed by a slate gable roof. A sweeping half-timbered facade gable dominates the left side of the facade. Adjacent is a flat arch entry with rusticated cast stone surround; it is headed by a cast stone oriel. A facade chimney is located to the right.

**Verbal Boundary Description and Justification**

The Farlow Hill Historic District, in easternmost Newton Corner, contains 37 houses and one vacant lot that are roughly bounded by Franklin Street (N), Chamberlain Road (E), Huntington Road and Kenrick Street (S), and Waverley Avenue (W). Boundaries are the lot lines of these properties as shown on the attached Engineering Map. The boundaries are drawn to recognize the unique high-style architectural character and road system of Farlow Hill. They exclude less architecturally distinguished houses on the fringes of this core area.

### HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (cont.)

Building permits as generally not available for houses built before 1915 and are particularly sparse for the early residences on Farlow Hill. However architects were found for the following houses: **31 Farlow Road** (1915) - Kilham & Hopkins, **49 Farlow Road** (1915) - Halfdan M. Hanson\*, **59 Farlow Road** (1922) Clifford Allbright, **69 Farlow Road** (1928) John Barnard, **88 Farlow Road** (1917)- Chapman & Frazer. On Shornecliffe Road, architects were found for the following houses: **51 Shornecliffe Road** (1922) - Walter Blaney, **57 Shornecliffe Road** (1921) - Clifford Allbright, **65 Shornecliffe Road** (1951) - Albert M. Kreider, **79 Shornecliffe Road** (1915) - John Barnard, **106 Shornecliffe Road** (1911) - Brainerd & Leeds, **114 Shornecliffe** (1911) - Curtis W. Bixby, **122 Shornecliffe Road** (1914) - Ralph S. Vinal. On Beechcroft Road, architects were found for the following houses: **12 Beechcroft Road** (1905) - possibly Samuel Brown, **30 Beechcroft Road** (1920) - John Barnard, **38 Beechcroft Road** (1912) - Brainerd & Leeds.

Although J. H. Chapman died in 1895, the firm of Chapman and Frazer, formed in 1892 is well-known in the Boston area. Horace S. Frazer (1862-1931), who began his career in the offices of Peabody and Stearns, carried on under the old firm name of Chapman and Frazer, developing a reputation synonymous with fine domestic architecture. Individual houses in Newton include 85 Bigelow Road in West Newton (1913; WN-0112) and a number of houses in the Farlow Hill area and in the expanded Chestnut Hill district(CH-G).

Another well known Boston-area firm, Kilham & Hopkins (later Kilham, Hopkins and Greeley), was established in 1900. James Hopkins (1873-1938) and Walter Kilham (1868-1948) were particularly known for their designs of school and other public buildings, as well as their residential work. The house at 31 Farlow Road was designed by them for Clarence Conant Colby, lawyer, president and general manager of the Samson Electric Company of Canton, who was born in Boston in 1879. Mr. Colby married Nellie Hopewell of Newton, living first at 58 Nonantum Street, before building the house on nearby Farlow Road. Mr. Colby was typical of the well-connected, affluent business men who chose to settle on Farlow Hill which soon became one of the most attractive and desirable residential areas in Newton.

Popular local architects Edmund Leeds of Brainerd and Leeds, John Barnard, and Albert Kreider were all Newton residents. Leeds grew up in Newton and was trained at M.I.T.

and the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. The firm was responsible for a large number of public buildings in the New England area and locally for the Y. M. C. A. (1911) and the first F. A. Day Junior High School (1922). Residences include those on Farlow Hill and the Edwin Childs House at 340 California Street (1915; NO-067). John Barnard's first commission in Newton was the Harriman House (1916) at 825 Centre Street, which is presently known as Putnam House on the Boston College Newton Campus (N-A). Barnard became known in Newton as a result of this commission and eventually made his home at 72 Agawam Road in Waban. Other houses include the Frank A. Day Junior House (1924) at 170 Sargent Street, the Davidson House (1925) at 99 Aspen Avenue in Auburndale and a large number of more modest homes throughout Newton. Albert Kreider was very active in Newton beginning in 1930s. He designed some public and commercial buildings and a number of residences, more often of a modest nature.

Little is known of the other architects identified in the Farlow Hill area. Clifford Allbright practiced in the Boston area between 1919 and 1945, Walter Blaney from 1921 to 1933, Curtis W. Bixby from 1905 to 1922, and Ralph S. Vinal from 1900 to 1931.

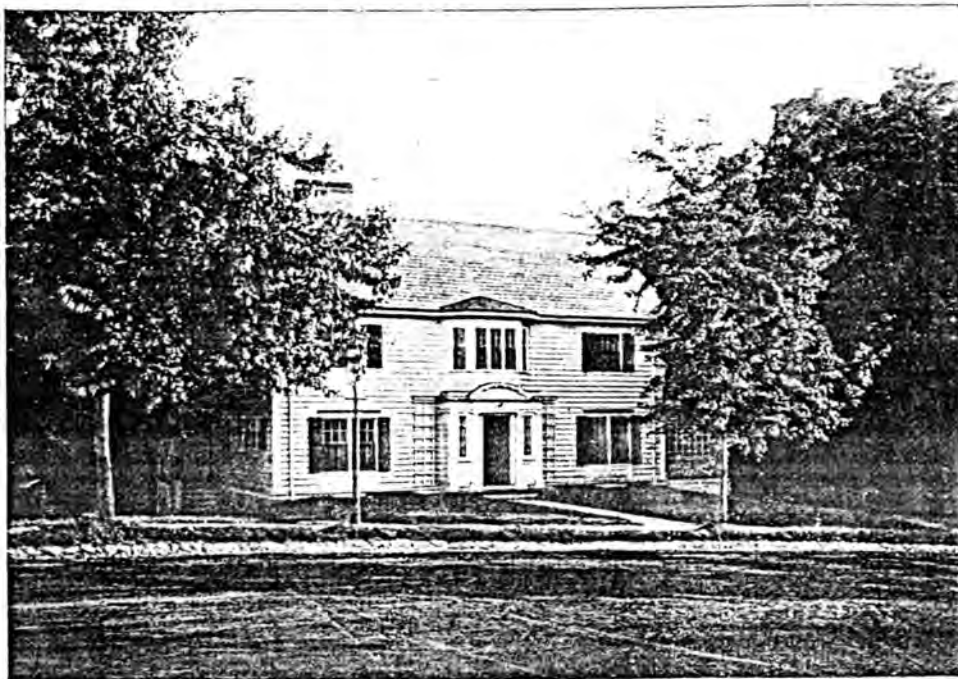

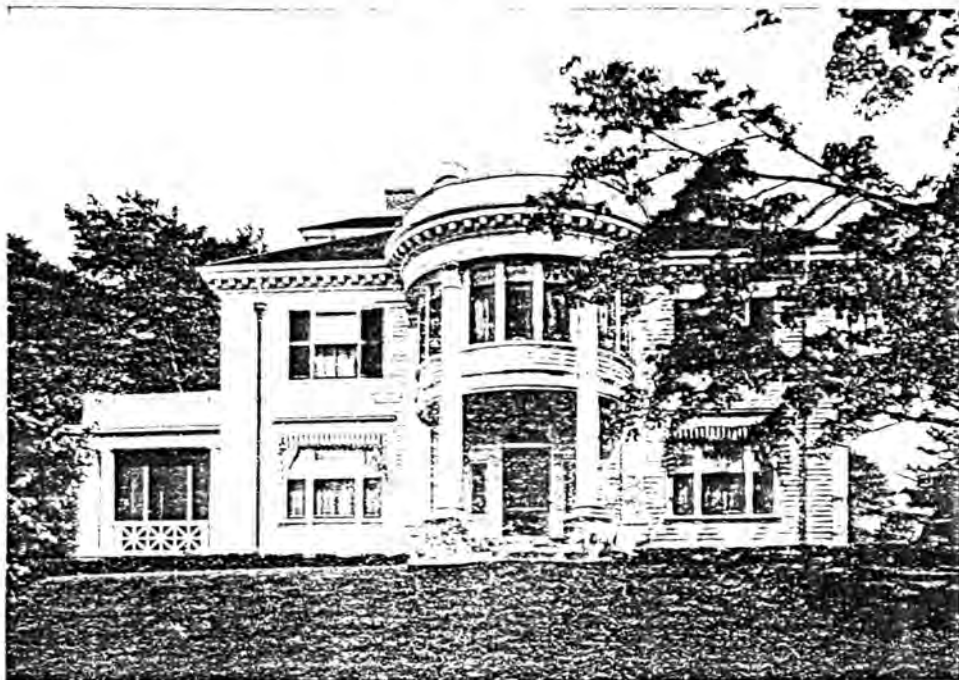
