Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Langston Clark Barn is a four pen cantilevered log barn built ca. 1890. The logs have square notching and the second story has weatherboard sheathing. The roofline is gable and of metal standing seam. The upper story is cantilevered approximately three feet over the first story log section. The interior is of both mortise and tenon and balloon frame construction and divided into four pens separated by runways. Doors are of original vertical board design. On the east facade is a single pen frame addition added ca. 1910 with vertical board siding.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Langston Clark Barn is significant under criterion C as a notable example of a cantilevered log barn. The barn is one of only six four-crib cantilevered log barns inventoried in the county and has not been altered since ca. 1910 when a frame addition was added to the east facade. The barn is composed of four lower-level log cribs, a frame loft with weatherboard siding, side facing gables and a roof ridge parallel to the front and rear of the structure. The barn continues to be used for hay and silage storage and retains its original site and setting.

This barn was constructed ca. 1890 by Langston Clark who farmed over one hundred acres along Sixmile Creek. The barn built by Clark was a large four-crib cantilevered design and was used as a stock barn. Around ca. 1910, a frame addition was added to the east facade for storage and additional livestock stalls. The Clark family owned the property until 1939 when it was sold to Tom Quiett. The Quiett family farmed the land and used the barn until its sale in 1975 to the present owner. No substantial changes or alterations have occurred to the barn in recent years.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary for the Langston Clark Barn is illustrated on the accompanying Blount County tax map 113, lot 64.01, which is drawn at a scale of 1" = 400'. The property is a rectangular lot which measures 100' by 75' whose northwest corner is 20' from the northwest foundation corner of the barn and whose southeast corner is 20' from the southeast foundation corner of the barn. The building sits See continuation sheet in an open field to the south of Sixmile Road.

Boundary Justification

The boundary for the Langston Clark Barn includes the building and adjacent lot which are historically associated with the property. No other farm buildings or structures are associated with the property.

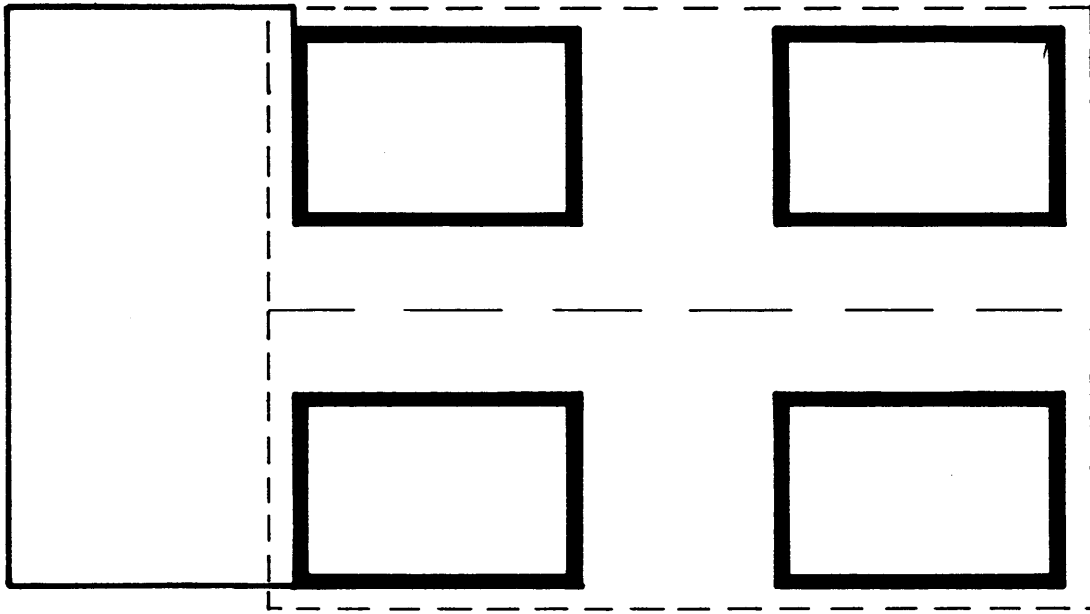
