

### **Narrative Description**

#### **Summary and Setting**

The horse barn is located within the mixing circle. The mixing circle currently contains a collection of both National Park Service (NPS) and Utah Parks Company (UPC) buildings, moved to the area beginning in the 1950s. The horse barn (constructed by the NPS) is located at the east edge of a low, timbered knoll -- at the west edge of the mixing circle. A system of pole corrals is located adjacent to the north and west sides.

## **Description**

This one-and-one-half story, rectangular (18' X 21'6"), wood frame building is constructed on a concrete slab-on-grade foundation. Exterior walls are covered with 12" weatherboard siding, painted brown. The gable roof is covered with natural wood shingles and has exposed rafter ends. The west elevation contains a single entry, with a board and batten door with one small light. This elevation also contains a four-light by four-light sliding window in the ground floor and a four-light hopper window in the gable end. The east elevation contains a four-light by four-light sliding window in the ground floor and a board and batten hay door in the gable end. The south elevation contains a set of board doors flanked on either side by four-light by four-light sliding windows, and a single entry with a five-panel door on the east end. The overall dimensions and exterior appearance of this building conforms in all major aspects to the building shown in the original architectural plans dated April of 1929. Exceptions to this include the additional single entry in the east end of the south elevation. This may have been added when the building was moved to its current location.

Although the exterior displays integrity of materials, workmanship and design, the interior of the barn has been remodeled into a mechanic's shop. The interior consists of one large room and two small rooms. The walls of the two small rooms are covered with 2" shiplap boards; the large room has been remodeled into a mechanic's shop and has sheet rock walls and new florescent lighting. #### Narrative Statement of Significance

The horse barn has local significance under National Register criterion C, as an example of NPS rustic building design. The period of significance is 1929, the date of development of the building plan from the Branch of Plans and Design. This resource is included in the property type that includes buildings and structures associated with NPS administrative development within Bryce Canyon National Park (BRCA), and is included under the Bryce Canyon National Park Multiple Property Submission.

The construction of the horse barn occurred soon after the NPS assumed administrative control of the park from the US Forest Service. During this phase, the NPS moved quickly to establish the infrastructure critical to the completion of administrative functions within the park. Plans for all buildings constructed in the park were reviewed and approved by the park's landscape architect. The design for the horse barn selected for BRCA, is representative of the use of a simplified rustic design for administrative buildings located in areas that would not be frequented by park visitors. The old NPS maintenance area was formerly located at the end of an administrative access road west of the original housing area (the Old NPS Housing Historic District), located well outside the area frequented by tourists.

# **Description (continued):**

building, can still be seen in the main work room of the interior.) As stated previously, the building currently lies on a concrete slab on grade floor/foundation, whereas the original building plans call for concrete footings. The floor plan show in the 1929 drawing shows a concrete floor only in the "grain room" which would have occupied a small corner of the building. This building formerly was located in the original NPS Utility area. In its current location the concessioner uses the building as a maintenance shop.




