45. Description and House Plan

One and three-fourths story, four-bay, four-room, dry-stone house, ca. 36 x 42; masonry broken coursed limestone, with sawn stone lintels and sills. Entrance with transom, four-panel door, in second bay from south corner. Eaves extend all around house. Small second floor windows on front and rear below eaves. Two full-size windows each floor in gable ends. All 6/6 sash, most original glass. Round loopholes to attic in each end. Exterior cellar entrance on southeast front.

Two interior chimneys at roof ridge had fireplaces on each side—one in each of the four rooms. The one in living hall still functions, has Greek Revival mantel. Woodwork all Greek Revival except west room which has Gothic; four-panel doors. Floor joists have regular vertical saw marks, a few circular; joists rest on longitudinal summer beam.

A modern family room and enclosed porch have been added to the rear, which have not damaged the structure or primary appearance of the house.

There is a two-room stone smoke quarters house just behind the house; a frame carriage barn on the north side; and a stone and frame bank barn (altered) west of the house. All are located on the west bank of Pleasant Run Creek. A 20th century stone bridge crosses the creek from the road. An older 19th century bridge crosses the creek branch southwest of the house. Wooded hillside behind house.
