The Carnegie Library and AAuditorium Building in Covington, Kentucky, is divided into two sections sharing a common exterior wall:

- 1)) The library, fronting on Scott Street, approximately $80' \times 80'$ with a center rotunda, balcony and basement is in sound physical condition and good repair.
- 2) The auditorium, fronting on Robbins Street, seating approximately 700 people in orchestra and balconies. This section of the building has been closed approximately fifteen (15) years and is in some dis-repair, but is structurally sound and can be renovated.

The building was erected and occupied in 1902 and is in the Neo-classic style of the French Renaissance Revival, typical of the Ecole des Beaux art international taste of the era.

Between 1886 and 1911, Andrew Carnegie personally gave away some \$40,000,000 to cities in the United States for the construction of public libraries. One of these cities was Covington, Kentucky, whose Carnegie Library and Auditorium Building has served the community unfailingly since its opening in 1903. The civic and cultural spirit of Covington that was so instrumental in acquiring the library near the turn of the century supported and patronized the library complex for the subsequent 68 years, is now attempting to preserve the usefulmess and beauty of the building for the The library building has in the past 68 years made an important cultural contribution to the community, not only as an 80,000 volume library but as a gathering and meeting place for every kind of activity, ranging from local productions of Gilbert & Sullivan plays, political rallies, lectures, speechs and church meetings. It's auditorium has heard many great names in history, from the moving dedicatory address by the eloquent W.C.P. Breckinridge in 1903, through William Jennings Bryant and Harry Lee Wwaterfield, Kentucky's two-time Lieutenant Governor, who was the last person to speak in the auditorium before its closing in 1955.

A new library building is now under construction on another site and the Carnegie Library and Auditorium is threatened with abandonment and demolition.

In an effort to preserve the building as a viable part of the city's cultural life, several citizens have formed the Northerm Kentucky Arts Council, which is heading a movement to restore the auditorium and library building for future use as an Arts Center. This proposed center would provide a modernized theatre facility to be used for local and traveling dramatic performances and lecture series, an exhibition hall and museum wherein local artists may display their work, as well as many culturally oriented exhibitions that are available from outside the immediate community at little or no cost, and a centrally located facility for various types of local arts and

crafts workshops for the citizens of Covington.

The Northern Kentucky Arts Council, working closely with the Kentucky Arts Commission and other agencies, has initiated an investigation into possible funding sources for this endeavor and preliminary indications are promising.

The library auditorium building is located with the jurisdiction of the Covington Model Cities Program area, and the Model Cities Program has already financed a Feasibility Study for the necessary renovation and also paid for roof repairs in the auditorium to prevent further deterioration.

Since the proposed Art Center would have great cultural impact within the Model Neighborhood, there may be additional monies available from this program in the future.

There are many architectural features that also speak for the preservation of this Carnegie Library Building. The following remarks by architect, Edward J. Beiting, Jr., President, Northern Kentucky Section, American Institute of Architects:

"The Carnegie Library and Auditorium Building in Covington has been a long and faithful servant to the people of the community. The building is capable of giving many more years of service in its new role as an Arts Center. It's demise would represent not only a great historical and architectural loss to the city, but a detriment to the continued cultural growth of its people."
