Description: Condition - good, altered

The Murphy Building is actually two buildings constructed one year apart but matched so perfectly in their details as to create one unit. Made of rusticated native sandstone, the building's Richardsonian Romanesque style popular at the turn of the century is demonstrated in the six arches, three to each building. Six windows on the second floor rest on a continuous sill. A parapet above the windows provides space for a sign. A semicircular stone with the dates 1897 and 1898 tops the center of the parapet. The north half (or the 1898 building) has a projecting awning inscribed "Musuem of Pioneer History" and an entrance through the sixth arch. The south half (or 1897 building) has a modern entrance through the second arch with a single door and window in the first arch. Each of the other arches has a display window.

Significance: 1897-1898 Builder/Architect: Unknown

The double sandstone building known as the Murphy Building was constructed by A. E. Mascho who operated it as a grocery store until 1913. At that time he sold it to John Franklin and Ella Murphy who continued the grocery store. The north half now houses the Lincoln County Historical Society's Museum of Pioneer History and the south half houses a western wear store. Architect John Robinson believes the building to be "a fantastic example of pioneer and territorial architecture."

Summary

The Mascho Building, listed in the National Register in 1984 as the Murphy Building, is a two-story, Richardsonian Romanesque building constructed of sandstone. At the rear of the building is a brick privy with a wood shake roof, constructed ca. 1920. The privy is a one-story building approximately fifty-six inches square on the exterior. It is unusual because it has the original plumbing, which includes a flush mechanism. It exhibits integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.

Description

The brick privy occupies its original site near the west (rear) side of 717 Manvel Avenue, which is the north half of the Murphy Building in Chandler, Oklahoma. It is a low, one-story building approximately fifty-six inches square on the exterior. The brick bearing walls are seventy-eight inches high. The gabled roof is pitched at forty-five degrees and is oriented east-west. (Photo #1)

The privy exhibits a great deal of architectural integrity. The original walls, floor, and toilet are intact. The brick bearing walls are constructed of common red brick with a range of shades, including a small percentage of highly vitrified faces. Mortar joints appear to be original. Interior walls are plaster over brick. The original interior plaster has not been restored and much of the original plaster is intact. The floor is an unfinished concrete slab. The toilet fixture was reputed to have a wooden seat (not extant) that activated a flushing mechanism when depressed, and the remaining NPS Form 10-900-a (8-86)

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plumbing hardware supports this information. (Photo #3) This type of "revolutionary seat-activated flushing device"¹ was patented by Sir Thomas Crapper in 1891 and may have been utilized for the Chandler privy. Dr. LeRoy Fischer, a historian who has conducted research on Oklahoma's historic privies for nearly a decade, states that the privy "...appears to have been the flushtype facility with the original commode still extant."²

The privy has been rehabilitated, primarily to weatherproof the building. The badly deteriorated wooden roof was replicated, and a roof covering of plywood, asphalt impregnated felt, and wood shakes was applied. The wooden plank door was replicated and door hardware reused, and a deteriorated sheet metal chimney vent stack was replaced with a new sheet metal vent stack to match the configuration of the original. A relatively new concrete block addition has been built onto the Mascho Building which obscures the north side of the privy because of its proximity.

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8. Statement of Significance

Applicable National Register Criteria: Criterion C

Area of Significance: Architecture

Period of Significance: 1897-98, ca. 1920

Architect/Builder: Unknown

Summary

The Mascho Building, constructed in two phases in 1897-98, is listed in the National Register (as the Murphy Building) for its significance as an outstanding example of territorial commercial architecture in Chandler. Ca. 1920, the brick privy was constructed at the rear of the property. The privy is significant as a rare and outstanding example of a brick privy in Lincoln County, Oklahoma. Although on the Mascho Building property, it was a detached building and likely was intended for public use, since it was the only privy in the Chandler commercial district.

Architectural Significance

The Mascho Building, constructed in two phases in 1897-98, is listed for its significance as an outstanding example of territorial commercial architecture in Chandler. It was constructed for A. E. Mascho, who operated it as a grocery store until 1913. At that time the building was sold to John Franklin and Ella Murphy, who continued to operate it as a grocery store. Ca. 1920, the Murphys constructed the brick privy at the rear of the property.

The privy is significant as the only remaining example of a brick privy in Lincoln County, Oklahoma. In 1984, historian LeRoy Fischer, Ph.D., who conducted extensive research for an article on "Oklahoma's Historic Privies,"

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wrote that "...for our state [it] is the only brick one still in existence."³ Subsequent to this assertion, two dilapidated brick privies were found near an abandoned school house in Lincoln County; however, their architectural integrity is inferior to that of the public privy behind the Mascho/Murphy Building. Dr. Fischer's research has revealed no other brick privies extant in

Lincoln County or in other downtown settings in the State of Oklahoma.

The building of the privy in 1920 likely was a product of state health officials' recognition of the connection between safe sewage disposal and pure drinking water, and the regulation of sewage disposal by the State Board of Health as mandated by the Oklahoma legislature in 1917. The privy is a rare example of physical evidence of improvements in sanitation and a manifestation of the growing importance of infrastructure in Chandler.
