DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

"Magnolia," the gracious colonial home Judge Spaulding built in 1910 and the Tom Bagwells have now restored, is quite typical in style and certainly not overly pretentious ... at least by post-Civil War, Deep South standards. It is, however, quite impressive for its time and place ... early statehood years in the old Choctaw Nation.

Basically, the white frame house is a two-story, 50 x 30-foot shell, highlighted by a classic portico, supported by four massive Doric columns and topped by a balustrade. The roof line is broken by three plain dormers. The main floor features a large entrance hall that contains the stairway. The living room and dining room are to the left; a large den is on the right. The kitchen area is beyond the entrance foyer. The second floor, its space juggled somewhat now to accommodate present-day needs and amenities, contains three bedrooms and two baths, the stairway leading to the attic, and a generous hall/balcony area.

The Olive family made some improvements after they bought the house in 1946, but the most important changes have been made by the Bagwells since 1972. However, a balcony across the rear of the house is the principal exterior change. Inside the main alteration has been the opening of the stairway to provide greater space of the Bagwells' glassware collections. Also added were such "functional" things as new wiring, plumbing, insulation, and a third bath.

Otherwise, an effort has been made to preserve both the substance of the original house and its spirit. The only floor coverings, for example, are carpets in areas such as kitchen, laundry and baths where coverings had previously existed. All other floors, still in excellent condition, are of the original polished oak. The two-story portico columns are new, but only because the originals were destroyed in a storm. In woodwork, draperies and furnishings the present owners have tried to capture much of the flavor of the old in their restoration.

The same holds true with the exterior and the grounds. "Magnolia," as they have renamed the old home, is nestled among huge red and post oaks, hickory, pecan and cherry trees, some of which were undoubtedly on the full-block site when Judge Spaulding built the house. To them the Bagwells have added magnolia, redbud, dogwood, and holly, along with wisteria, crepe myrtle, rose bushes, and other plants and shrubs indigenous to southeastern Oklahoma. They have also restored the one-time servants' questers (converting it into a guest house), added an authentic gazebo, and refurbished an old fountain.

Federal Judge George A. Spaulding, a native of New York, came to Kansas as a young man. He was admitted to the practice of law in that state in 1881 and to the U. S. Supreme Court in 1902. He moved to Indian Territory in 1896 and two years later he was appointed U. S. Commissioner, a position he filled in several Choctaw Nation locations until 1907. After statehood he opened a law office, with another judge, in Idabel, continuing that practice until 1917 when, again as U. S. Commissioner, he was based in Ardmore.

Mrs. Spaulding's family also played a role in the development of this area, before and after statehood. Her father, Francis D. Taaffe, of Choctaw blood, was with the U. S. Geological Survey in 1897. From 1900-1902, as a surveyor, he helped the Arkansas and Choctaw Railroad, now a Frisco branch. For the rest of his life he served in a variety of surveying and engineering jobs at the county, state and federal level. Spaulding built this house in 1910 and until he left Idabel it was one of the town's social centers. (He died in 1930, but some of his family live in Idabel today.)

The Richard Olive family owned the house from 1946 to 1972, when it was purchased by the present owners. Tom Bagwell is medical supervisor for the Weyerhaeuser Company. Betty Bagwell, a teacher, was long associated with the McCurtain County school system. Both are active in the community, interested in history and the preservation of the county's rich cultural heritage. (He was first president of the McCurtain County Historical Society.) They promptly began an ambitious restoration program and it is now virtually complete, inside and out. With its period furnishings - some items closely associated with early-day county families - the house again serves as a community gathering place.
