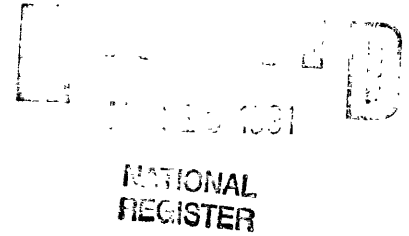

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**Describe present and historic physical appearance.**

Lawton Park is located off Prestwood Drive on the southeast bank of Prestwood Lake in Hartsville. The Lawton Park Pavilion is located adjacent to a swimming area and is an excellent example of a public recreational structure showing Colonial Revival influence. This park and pavilion are representative of Hartsville's historic public facilities.

Lawton Park is a wooded, 3.5 acre, public recreation area including a swimming area, playground, picnic area, and tennis courts. The park includes three buildings: a pavilion, shed, and keeper's house. The keeper's house has been extensively altered and does not contribute to the historic character of the park.

The Lawton Park Pavilion is a frame, rectangular plan, two-story building with a hip roof and cupola. Bathhouse facilities including locker rooms and showers are located on the ground floor. The second floor consists of one large open room designed for dances and community activities. All four elevations feature bands of grouped windows at the second floor. Louvered vents are located immediately below the windows and also at the first floor. The facade is characterised by a central entry portico with paired slender tuscan columns and flanking brick stairs.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Lawton Park and Lawton Park Pavilion, on Prestwood Lake, are significant as examples of New-Deal era public recreational facilities, funded by the Federal government and built by the Works Progress Administration (later the Work Projects Administration).

Lawton Park, built 1939-1941, was planned as early as 1938. In that year Joseph J. Lawton (1861-1941), prominent Hartsville businessman and manufacturer, donated three-and-one-half acres on Prestwood Lake to the town specifically for use as "a play-ground or recreation park and/or swimming and bathing place."(1) The Hartsville town government applied to the Works Progress Administration for Federal funds and labor to build the park, named in honor of Lawton, and its facilities. The plans included "a two story club house [Lawton Park Pavilion], a keeper's house, playground and equipment, picnic grounds with open air ovens, and swimming facilities. Dressing rooms and baths will be located in the ground floor of the main club house, while the second floor will be one large room suitable for dances and community gatherings."(2) Although work began in the fall of 1939 and the W.P.A. quickly approved Hartsville's proposal, Lawton Park was not completed and opened to the public until the spring of 1941. "This area is of unusual natural beauty," the Hartsville Messenger observed, describing the park. "Many junipers, some large ones, line the shore in this section and the lake here is specially adapted for growing lilies. Throughout the park there are pines, hickory, dogwood and myrtle bushes, all of which lend beauty to the recreation area."(3)
