DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building is a residence club. The first two floors, which are for public use, form the base of the building. They are grand in scale and their facade is richly ornamented. The four upper floors form a tower which contains the residence rooms. The tower has the same character as the lower floors, but the decorative elements are appropriately scaled down. The elevations are punctuated by a rhythm of fenestration on the principal floors, of varied shapes and sizes which reflect the importance and function of the space within. The fenestration ranges from paired arches emphasized by broad bands of rich cast decoration on their perimiter and filled with leaded glass to simple rectangular openings with plain glazing in steel casement sash. The south facade steps back at the second floor line to provide balconies off the principal spaces on that floor. The interior, with its high ceilinged grand rooms, is of a medieval character. Julia Morgan buildings were characteristically designed from the inside out, with the structural materials becoming part of the design. Movement through and within the building largely dictated the design. The public spaces were richly furnished with Oriental antiques and Victorian furniture.

Condition of fabric is excellent. The building has been well cared for. The furnishings are all original with the building and are also in excellent condition. Overall dimensions: 119' x 135' x 75' high.

Foundations: reinforced concrete

Wall construction: reinforced concrete

Framing: reinforced concrete

Apertures: precast stone details and Gothic style tracery in the structure and major fenestration and in public spaces in the interior. Huge, walk-in fireplaces in public rooms. Interior garden courts. Large indoor swimming pool.

Chimneys: reinforced concrete; brick lined. Fireplace fronts are cast stone, marble and carved wood. All fireplaces are grand in scale. Some are elegantly simple, others are quite richly ornamented.

Openings:

Doorways and doors: entrance doors and those to the courts and terraces are steel styled and rails with leaded glass. Interior doors are of carved wood.

Windows: windows are all steel but the more significant openings are filled with leaded glass.

Roof: shape and covering-hipped and clay tile.

cornice, eaves-minimal overhang on all roofs. Some eaves shelter decorated courses. On the upper walls, around and above the main entrance, below the windows at the top floor and at the top of the towers, there are bands of geometric, formed or cast concrete decoration. Lower roofs have parapets.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Berkeley City Club is a most significant building as a Julia Morgan eclectic outstanding example of a style and as a well-maintained example of skillful integration of structure, design and use of light and shadow contributing to its beauty. It is a product of Julia Morgan, 1929, with Bernard Maybeck, contributed a portion of the Bay Area Style.

The Berkeley City Club was designed and built, in 1929. There are many fine examples of San Simeon (Hearst Castle), of Miss Morgan's work, the Berkeley being a maintained example of this particular work on San Simeon as she was rapidly and whatever else had struck the imagination. San Simeon was a great project. The Berkeley City Club building was done for educational, and philanthropic activities for club buildings from the Los Angeles City Club building is an excellent example of an elegant social club that was very popular which is now an anachronism.

Miss Morgan was a pioneer who studied and admitted to the engineering school at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris, in 1904. She returned to the Bay Area and, in 1915, to San Francisco to practice architecture. Many of buildings for which she had consulted and Honolulu as well as all over the world. BUILDER ARCHITECT Julia Morgan

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Berkeley City Club is a most significant structure of a type in a region, and is notable as a Julia Morgan eclectic medieval/gothic residential club. It is an outstanding example of a style and architectural movement. It is an outstanding and well-maintained example of Julia Morgan's work. The building's scale, integration of structure, design and ornamentation, the dramatic spaces and use of light and shadow contribute to its overall excellence.

It is a product of Julia Morgan, 1872-1957, Bay Area architect, a woman, along with Bernard Maybeck, contributed a style of architecture which became known as the Bay Area Style.

The Berkeley City Club was designed and constructed at the height of Miss Morgan's career, in 1929. There are many similarities between it and her most well known creation, San Simeon (Mearst Castle), now a State Park. While there are many examples of Miss Morgan's work, the Berkeley City Club is the most representative and best maintained example of this particular style in the Bay Area. The style evolved in her work on San Simeon as she was required to fit together parts of castles, churches and whatever else had struck the fancy of William Randolph Hearst during his travels in Europe. San Simeon was done for a single client, of course, and the Berkeley City Club building was done for a civic group dedicated to cultural, educational, and philanthropic activities. Julia Morgan developed her own style for club buildings from the influences of the work on Hearst Castle. The Berkeley City Club Building is an excellent example of her architecture for the type of elegant social club that was very popular during the twenties and thirties and which is now an anachronism.

Miss Morgan was a pioneer who stunned publicity. She was the first woman to be admitted to the engineering school at the University of California. She had no school of architecture then. She was also the first woman to be admitted to the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris, in 1900. After completing her studies in Paris she returned to the Bay Area and, after a few years, opened her own office in San Francisco to practice architecture. She designed and oversaw the construction of buildings for which she had commissions in Salt Lake City, Sacramento, Pasadena and Honolulu as well as all over the Bay Area.

The building is still the possession of its original owners. In 1962 the name was changed from the Berkeley Women's City Club to the Berkeley City Club and the bylaws were changed to admit men as members.


