Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Darrington Ranger Station

Ranger's Residence #1230: 1921; detached dwelling; 26' x 44'; rectangular plan, 1-1/2 story, wood frame, poured concrete foundation, basement, wood shingled medium gabled roof; south (main) facade recessed width of gable end on ground level to form porch, supported by two large square posts at corners, four 4 x 4 posts interspaced, raised open platform, plant surface; shed-roofed enclosed end-porch off-set on north gable end. Single stretcher-bond brick exterior chimney, off-center on east elevation. Wood-shingle exterior in alternate rows with staggered butts. One-over-one double-hung sash windows, singly and in combinations with mullions. Mullion window with two one-over-one sashes centered on south gable end has decorated projecting lugsill bearing a small simple railing, with turned corner posts. Sterm doors and windows added. No significant exterior alteration apparent.

Assistant Ranger's Residence #1229: 1922; detached dwelling, 24' x 45'; rectangular plan, 1-1/2 story wood frame, poured concrete foundation, wood-shingled medium gable roof with gable porch supported by pairs of 8 x 8 posts and semi-enclosed by simple railing offset on south gable end, enclosed end-porch, low hip roof, 1-story, width of north gable end, small shed-roofed lean-to abuts center of end porch. Two brick interior chimneys straddle ridegline. Wood shingle exterior in alternate rows with staggered butts. One-over-one double-hung sash windows in pairs with mullions; eight-horizontal-light sashes, on north enclosed end porch. No decoration. Shed-roofed lean-to may be a later addition.

Wood Shed #1649: Detached storage building; 20' x 16' 2"; rectangular plan, 1 story, poured concrete foundation, nailed-wood frame, wood-shingled medium gable roof. Exterior walls are clad with wood shingles in alternate rows with staggered butts. Four-light single sash windows. Single-leaf vertical-plane door offset to right on main elevation. No apparent exterior modifications.

Ranger's Garage #1575: Detached vehicle storage and wood shed; 30' 2" x 22', rectangular plan, 1-story, poured concrete foundation, nailed-wood frame, wood-shingled medium gable roof. Exterior walls are clad with wood shingles in alternate rows with staggered butts. Two sash windows in eight-light vertical divisions. Horizontal slide-opening vehicle doors enclose three bays on main west-facing elevation; vertical board materials replaced with plywood on right-end door.

Crewhouse #1232: 1934; detached dwelling; 27' x 47' rectangular plan, 1-1/2 story wood frame, poured concrete foundation, basement, wood-shingled high gable roof, east (front) wall recessed one-half length of structure to form porch, supported by heavy squared-timber posts having large curving brackets affixed; rear entrance, center north facade, recessed in corner of roof extension. Two hipped dormers on west slope of roof; two interior end chimneys, coursed, squared rubble. Horizontal clapboard exterior, ground floor, vertical boards, battens every other board on gable ends and on upper level west elevation. Mullion windows of three eight-over-eight double-hung sashes; nine-light sashes singly and in combinations. No decoration; storm doors and windows added, no significant structural alterations to exterior.

Truck Storage #2315: 1938; 30' x 30', detached, 10 bays open storage; rectangular plan, 1 story, poured concrete foundation, nailed wood frame, wood-shingled medium gable roof. Exterior walls are clad with horizontal 1 x 12 beveled siding (10" to weather); vertical board and batten on gable ends. Twelve-light single sash windows singly and in pairs with mullions. Single-leaf door offset to right on left elevation. No decoration. Originally a nine-bay garage. Repartitioned at an unknown date, apparently in conjunction with enclosure of southernmost four bays behind sliding doors (overhead rail remains over these bays). The doors were in turn removed at an unknown date.

Carpenter Shop #1316: 1938; 100' x 30'; rectangular plan, 1-1/2 story wood frame, poured concrete foundation, wood-shingled medium gable roof; projecting gable offset on east (main) facade forms porch, supported by two stone columns of ashlar-like coursed rubble masonry; two gabled hoods supported by 4 x 4 brackets offset on west elevation above entries. Horizontal clapboard exterior, vertical boards, battens every other board on gable ends, vertical boards only on porch gable pediment. Six-over-six double-hung sashes singly and in combinations with mullions. Originally the fire warehouse, modifications for subsequent use include: enclosure of two freight doors (bearing walls clad with horizontal beveled siding), fenestration pattern changed ((new window divisions, sash are similar in appearance to original),

Carpenter Shop #1316 (continued): addition of gable porch with masonry posts, center, main facade. The building lacks the capacity to convey its historic identity and function with the alterations, and does not individually qualify. It does retain location and spatial relationship with the historic group, and sufficient architectural vocabulary to be unintrusive.

Automotive Shop #2190: 1938; 58' x 100'; U-shaped, 2-story wood frame, poured concrete foundation, medium gable roof with projecting offset gables at either end, three large gable dormers, south slope, main gable; single brick interior chimney offset on south slope. Horizontal clapboard exterior, vertical boards, battens every other board on all gable ends and on dormer gable pediments. Nine-light sash windows, singly and in combinations with mullions; two nine-light sash windows in each dormer. Large vertical-opening doors, centered, each main gable end, three similar doors interspaced on north elevation. Rectilinear pattern of three pine tree cut-outs centered on offset gable ends, a large, well-defined center tree, flanked by two similar but smaller trees, two equal-sized well-shaped pine tree cut-outs above center on east and west main gable ends, and a single pine tree cut-out centered on each dormer pediment. Metal ventilators installed on north (rear) slope of roof. Wood shingle roof materials replaced with textured sheet metal roofing.

Fire Warehouse #2215: 1933; 32' 4" x 36' 6"; rectangular, 1 story wood frame, wood-shingled medium gable roof, single brick interior chimney, center, north slope of roof. Wood shingle exterior in alternate rows with staggered butts. Six vertical-light sash windows singly and in combinations with mullions. Single-leaf door offset on east gable end, large, slide-opening door offset on west gable end. Entries not covered. No decoration; no apparent exterior alteration.

FR&T Warehouse #2275: 1933; 24' 5" x 36' 6"; rectangular, 1 story wood frame, wood-shingled medium gable roof. Wood shingle exterior, in alternate rows with staggered butts. Six-horizontal-light sash windows. Large slide-opening door, offset east gable. Entry not covered. No decoration; no apparent exterior alteration.

Blacksmith Shop #2216: 1935; 24' 4" x 16' 6"; rectangular, 1 story wood frame, wood-shingle medium gable roof. Horizontal clapboard exterior, vertical boards, battens every two boards on gable ends. Nine-light sash windows. Two-leaf vertical board doors with nine-light windows centered, west gable end. Two well-defined pine tree cut-outs, equidistant from center, on west gable end only. No obvious alteration to exterior.

Gas & Oil House #2525: 1938; 16' 4" x 22' 6"; rectangular, wood frame, poured concrete foundation, wood-shingled medium gable roof; east anterior wall recessed to form umbrage, entry flanked by two heavy squared-timber posts with large curving inset brackets; raised timber and plank loading dock abut west gable end. Vertical board and batten exterior, horizontal clapboard on gable ends. Mullion windows having two four-light sashes are flanked by proportionate vertical board decorative shutters with simple pine tree cut-outs centered. Three vertical-light sashes flank the entry. No obvious exterior alteration.

Barn #2415: 1916; 30' x 67'; rectangular, wood frame, wood-shingled bellcast gambrel roof. Horizontal board exterior, end boards. Nine-light sash windows. Large slide-opening door, reinforced diagonal board, center south gable end; hay door center south gable end at left level; two-leaf vertical board door, center not gable end. No decoration; some exterior material alterations.

Equipment Shed #2316: 1935; detached, eight bays open storage, 88' x 24'' rectangular plan, peeled-pole frame, medium salt-box gable roof. Exterior walls are clad with split shakes. No windows. Wood shingle roof materials replaced with textured metal sheet roofing. Left bay is enclosed with plywood, second bay is enclosed with wire cage. No apparent structural or material modifications to exterior.

Equipment Shed #2375: 1938; detached, six bays open storage; 72' x 24'; rectangular plan, peeled pole frame, medium salt-box gable roof. Exterior walls are clad with split shakes. No windows. Wood shingle roof materials replaced with textured sheet metal roofing. Original partial enclosure of right bay has been removed. No apparent structural or material modifications to exterior.

Noncontributing Buildings: There are 28 other buildings within the property boundary, including single-family residences, garages, bunhouses, storage buildings and offices. These were built between 1945 and 1985. Minor structures (fences, gates, walkways, radio tower, etc.) are also present, and were constructed during the same period. The list above includes all buildings and structures contributing to the significance of the Darrington Ranger Station.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Darrington Ranger Station typifies the construction projects undertaken by the Civilian Conservation Corps and signifies the aid to the local community provided by the emergency work-relief program through employment of youth and experienced craftsmen, purchase of building materials and camp supplies, and personal expenditures of enrollees. The property represents the Forest Service's presence in the locality, as the headquarters for field operation, and denotes, via the physical facilities required to to carry out the agency's expanding responsibilities, the critical transition in the Service's development from custodial superintendence to extensive resource management. The Darrington Ranger Station exemplifies the rustic architectural idiom developed by the Forest Service, Pacific Northwest Region, to impart Forest Service identity and to represent its purposes and ideals, and signifies the agency's particular interpretation of a singular expression of early twentieth century American architectural thought. Possessing high qualities of design and execution, the Ranger Station is a good example of an architectural locution invested with special aesthetic and associative values by the agency that created it.
