

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Algernon Bangs House of Augusta, Maine, built in 1892, is a large vernacular example of the Queen Anne style.

The $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story house is of frame construction with truncated gable roof, 3-story tower, clapboarded and shingled siding, two internal brick chimneys, and brick and granite foundation.

The facade, which faces north, is two bays wide with a one-story porch which wraps around the entire north end of the building. The entrance is recessed and consists of a panelled door. The other first-story facade bay is an elaborate three-part window. The second story features a large, square, stained-glass window to the left and a pair of 1/1 windows to the right. In the half-story are 4-light single sash windows flanking a triangular window with ten panes.

The west side of the building is the most elaborate, with a roughly central tower flanked by two bays to the left and two to the right. The planes of all three components are different. The tower itself is square in plan with a maximum of two bays on each side. Here fenestration is particularly variegated, with a curved window inset in the exposed corner along with a 2/2 window at first-story level, balconied French doors and a circular window in the second-story, and arched 2/2 windows at third and half-story levels, the latter with balconies on the west and south sides of the tower. Elsewhere on the west side of the house fenestration is more restrained (2/2, save for a 3-part bay with 1/1 and 1/1 windows above).

The east side contains paired and single 1/1 windows, as well as single-sash windows of several different forms (vertical rectangular, horizontal rectangular, square, and square set on point). This side of the house is unremarkable except for a nearly central gabled projecting bay.

The south end of the house is two bays wide with 2/2 fenestration and little ornamentation. Here the topography of the building lot exposes the cellar wall, and a covered stairway leads to a first-story rear door.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Built by Algernon Bangs, this striking if not architecturally ideal Queen Anne house on the east side of the Kennebec River, is a landmark with an interesting history. Probably designed at least in part by Bangs himself, it reflects the eclectic mood of the period with an astonishing variety of decorative features employed with vernacular originality.

Algernon Sidney Bangs, born in Farmington, Maine, in 1837, was from early youth, trained in mechanical arts and rose from apprentice to superintendent and, finally to manufacturer. He became involved in the lumber industry in 1868 and, coming to Augusta in 1881, established the firm of Bangs Brothers specializing in door and window manufacture. He achieved great financial success, serving as President of the Augusta Board of Trade. Of passing interest is the fact that the progressive Mr. Bangs advocated women's suffrage and believed (in 1897!) that "flying machines will eventually become modes of public conveyance".

After several subsequent owners, the house in 1922 was purchased by Augusta General Hospital for use as a nurses residence. It was then called St. Catherine's Hall after the girls' school which had originally owned the land before Bangs acquired it. From 1953 to 1980 it served as an apartment building but in the latter year was purchased for use as a medical professional building and is being faithfully rehabilitated.
