Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Tobler Vineyard House is a two-story double pen, 5 bay log residence built ca. 1825. The house was originally built in a two-story double pen form with a rear one-story ell which served as the kitchen. The rear ell was deteriorated by the early 20th century and a ca. 1910 frame addition was built to replace the original log kitchen.

The original two-story section has original exterior end stone chimneys, ca. 1840 applied weatherboard, and a gable roof with ca. 1984 wood shingles. The house has original pegged six-over-nine sash windows on the first story and six-over-six pegged sash on the second story. Many of the original window lights remain. The logs were exposed on the first story of the main facade ca. 1984 and display half-dovetail notching except where the two pens are joined. Here the logs have V notching and lap joints. Doors on the main facade are original with three raised panels. The main facade also features an original shed roof porch with ca. 1984 chamfered columns built to match the location and appearance of the original. At the rear southwest corner is a ca. 1984 two-story frame addition and screen porch. This addition has a gable roof of wood shingles and weatherboard siding. The rear kitchen wing has an added ca. 1910 room with weatherboard siding and six-over-six sash windows. The brick chimney on the rear wing was rebuilt ca. 1980. The rear porch was added ca. 1984.

The interior features original pine floors, vertical board wall sheathing, original Federal influenced mantles with raised panels, and a staircase with square balusters. The three panel doors are also original. At the rear are two non-contributing ca. 1984 frame and brick structures which house a sauna and grill. The house is located in a rural valley in the northeast section of the county.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Tobler Vineyard House is significant under criterion C as a notable example of an early 19th century double pen log residence with later additions. With the exception of the Thompson-Brown House (NR-1978), the Vineyard House is the best remaining example of a double pen log residence from this period. The house was constructed ca. 1825 by Tobler Vineyard in a fertile valley in northeast Blount County. With the exception of the replacement of the rear ell ca. 1910, no other significant alterations took place to the house until its renovation in 1984. This renovation retained the original design and detailing of the house and additions were confined to the rear facade.

This property was purchased by Tobler Vineyard in 1824 from James Crews. Tradition states that Vineyard built the house soon afterwards and the interior and exterior construction and detailing support its ca. 1825 attributed date. Vineyard owned over 100 acres in a fertile valley drained by Hollybrook Branch and operated his farm for several decades. Vineyard died in March of 1844 and his plantation with "dwelling house" was willed to his son William Vineyard. The property later passed into the hands of John Beal in 1852 and the Beal family resided at the house until it was sold in 1905 to R.A. Sharp. During most of the 20th century the house was owned by the Robert W. Trent family. In 1983 the house was purchased by the present owners who renovated the property in keeping with its original character. The house retains its original form and interior detailing such as its staircase, doors and mantles.
