JAIL
Description

SUMMARY. The Powhatan Jail is a box-shaped facility with a hipped roof, constructed of locally quarried native limestone, mortar and concrete. It is within walking distance of the Powhatan Courthouse and is an important part of that complex.

ELABORATION. The jail at Powhatan is the only remaining vernacular stone structure within the city limits. It is situated in a valley below the courthouse and is surrounded by thick vegetation. No specifications or plans have been discovered in order to precisely ascertain the building's original construction.

A square plan characterizes the jail, which is a one-story building. Originally the building had a cut stone floor, but poured concrete now covers the interior floor and a concrete porch extends outside. Constructed of roughly-hewn native limestone, the exterior walls give the appearance of a fortification, reminiscent of earlier log military blockhouses. Limestone mortar was used to bind the walls. From the patterns created by the tight-fitting stones, it can be surmised that builders not only used dry mortar techniques (cutting and fitting without mortar) but also used mortar to add additional security to the building (also like blockhouse construction, as mortar contributed to making the old wood blockhouses bulletproof).

The hipped roof members of the jail are apparent because of the deteriorating corrugated sheet metal sheathing the top of the building and the cupola, which was undoubtedly added later for ventilation during the years 1941-1945 when the building was used as a canning factory. The original roof shape was probably pyramidal, also consonant with blockhouse design.

The front facade (east elevation) is the main entrance to the jail. A poured concrete uncovered porch extends from the front of the jail approximately six feet. The foundation stones under the porch are larger, rusticated sandstones, which are noticeably different in color and texture from stones used in the walls.

The front door is an interesting object in and of itself. The remnants of an iron gate, approximately four feet high, open onto the porch and were joined to the exterior walls (no longer attached). The massive wood door at the entrance is hinged from the interior walls and is covered with a grid, fabricated iron overlay. This iron overlay may have been at one time a portcullis, since it extends above the door on the interior and appears to have been cut away to free the door when the building was no longer used as a jail facility. The locks and keys to this door and to the cell blocks (no longer in the jail) have been preserved in the Powhatan Courthouse Museum.

The anchors of the old cell-blocks are extant on the east facade; however, the cell blocks were removed when the jail was abandoned and dispersed among the Walnut Ridge, Hoxie and Black Rock correctional facilities.

The north elevation is a plain, solid wall of cut limestone, with one aperture to allow light on the inside.

The exterior wall on the west elevation was penetrated to make a rear entrance during the years the jail was used as a cannery during World War II and has been sealed with boards, painted gray. The mortar around this penetration is deteriorating and stones are falling away. There are no windows on the west elevation.

The south elevation is a plain, solid wall of cut limestone, with one aperture to allow light on the inside, identical to the north elevation.

On the interior, there is no ceiling, and the hipped roof members are exposed as well as the trusses that support the cupola. The original ceiling was probably flat. All interior walls are stucco, which may or may not be original. The stucco is deteriorating and the limestone walls are exposed in many places. The interior has been severely vandalized and is in danger of loss due to neglect.

This structure was built on Block 14 in Powhatan and encompasses the site of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 6.

JAIL *Significance*

SUMMARY. The Powhatan jail is nominated for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion A because it is an example of an early jail, one of a few still extant. Designed by the architect, Jno. D. Edwards, who also designed the original Powhatan Courthouse in 1873, this jail is the only civic building in Powhatan which dates to the construction of the first courthouse, built after Powhatan received the county seat in 1869 (completed in 1873). It is also nominated under Criterion C because it is a rare example of a stone, military blockhouse style jail.

The site on which the jail is situated is nominated under Criterion D for its potential to reveal further information about the civic affairs of this early boom town.

ELABORATION. Located in a small valley just west of the courthouse, the jail is within walking distance from the court. It was connected to the courthouse by a walkway during its years of usage as a jail. Stone crafting came to Lawrence County with the Germanic (northern and central Europe) immigrants who settled Arkansas territory in the early 1800s. Earlier jails were constructed from hewn logs and had the appearance of military blockhouses (e.g., Smithville jail, 1861). The jail at Powhatan may have been the first jail in the county constructed from locally quarried stone. The stone came from the farm of Ephram Sharp and was transported by wagon to the building site for use in both the courthouse and the jail.




