

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Dragonwick sits on a large, informally landscaped lot in Country Club Estates, a 1920s suburban development that features a golf course and country club. The house sits on a low rise, and is screened by several live oak trees along Wimbledon Drive.

The house itself is an excellent example of the Tudor Revival style. It is one and a half stories, all brick with a rustic Ludowici tile roof. Typical of the Tudor style, the house is irregularly massed, essentially an ell plan with a pair of staggered gables and chimney at the facade. The center gable features a sweeping eave terminating at the chimney, just a few feet off the ground. The entrance is recessed in this gable, and features a Tudor arch with stone The doorway itself includes a Tudor arch and vertical wood boards with strap hinges. The chimney includes stone shoulders and three copper flues. Windows throughout are a mixture of metal casement (first floor) and 6/6 sash (second floor). A modern one story wing (c. 1988) has been added off the west rear elevation. This addition is sympathetically done, being of the same materials and design as the main house.

The property includes two historic outbuildings (c. 1930). One is a one story, cinder block, gable roof to the sides guesthouse with casement windows. Its interior features natural finish trusswork and a painting on a Tudor theme by Mobile artist Edmond de Celle, done for the original owner. The second outbuilding is a garage, also one story cinderblock with a gable roof to the sides.

The interior of Dragonwick retains its integrity of style and design. The house is one room deep with an ell. The entrance leads into a central hall with stairway. Open Tudor arches on either side lead into the living room (west side) and dining room (east side). The kitchen is to the rear of the dining room in the ell. The interior includes original hardwood floors, hardware and cabinetry throughout. The entrance door is flanked by coat closets. The dining room features a pair of corner cupboards of colonial design. The living room features a wooden paneled chimney with a fine Tudor fireplace. The upstairs consists of a series of

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bedrooms and baths. An original basement houses the central heat and air units. The west addition includes a master bedroom and bath.

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# Statement of Significance

Dragonwick is significant under National Register Criteria C-Architecture as one of the finest Tudor Revival residences in Mobile. The building exhibits many features of the style, including multiple, steeply pitched gables, casement windows, prominent chimney and Tudor arches. The building is further significant for its intact interior which carries on Tudor themes in its doorways, hardware and fireplace.

# Historical Summary

During the 1920s a new suburban development was launched at Spring Hill, several miles west of downtown Mobile. Spring Hill had long been a retreat for Mobilians seeking its healthy water supply and two hundred foot elevation. By the 1920s automobiles had made the area more easily accessible to the city, and residential development, previously scattered and sparse, increased. An area south of Old Shell Road was developed as a residential, golf course and country club in 1926. Initially named Wimbledon, the development was subsequently known as Country Club Estates. A Mission Revival clubhouse was constructed (now altered and adapted beyond recognition) and individual lots were sold. Though several houses were constructed, the Depression slowed progress, and today the bulk of the houses are post 1945.

Among the earliest houses was that of John Cochrane, Jr., erected in 1929 by local builder J.F. Pate. Cochrane was only twenty-nine years old at the time, but was the son of a prominent businessman, John Cochrane, Sr., and was vice president of traffic management at the Alabama, Tennessee and Northern Railroad. His father was president of the line.

John Cochrane Jr.'s new house was a mini-estate, with a guesthouse, garage and large lot. He named the property Dragonwick, but despite the settled appearance, sold it in 1934.

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The house passed through two other owners before John and Lynn Roberts Jr. acquired it in 1986. The present owners added a wing to the west, and restored the interior. The house stands today as a fine example of the Tudor Revival in its heyday.

Context: Tudor Revival Architecture in Mobile in the early 20th century

A number of other Tudor Revival houses were constructed in Mobile during the early 20th century. Several examples exist in both the Old Dauphin Way and Ashland Place Historic Districts. A Tudor style orphanage, consisting of four two story buildings, was constructed at Spring Hill in 1914 along Old Shell Road. The Episcopal Diocese has not expressed an interest in National Register listing for this complex. The Tudor style was never wildly popular in Mobile. Mission Revival was much more popular during the early 20th century, perhaps because of the city's Latin heritage and semi-tropical climate.

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### VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot 2, Block 5, First Unit of Wimbledon, as per plat recorded in Map Book 2, Pages 4-7, Probate Court Records, Mobile County, Alabama, run thence South 07° - 36' -30" West and along the West line of Croydon Estates as per plat recorded in Map Book 29, Page 26 of the aforesaid records a distance of 89.34 feet to the Northwest corner of Lot 2, Croydon Estates, thence North 87° - 04' - 25" West 8.00 feet to a point, thence South 07° -34' -30" West 91.08 feet to a point, thence South 86° - 55' -15" East 8.13 feet to a point, thence South 04° - 20' West 28.13 feet to a point, thence South 89° - 51' - 55" West 4.89 feet to a point, thence South 07° - 10' - 15" West 36.60 feet to a point, thence South 89° - 42' - 08" West and along the South lines of Lots 27 & 6, Block 5, of the First Unit of Wimbledon 144.80 feet to a point, thence 07° - 16' West and along the East line of Rawlings Place as per plat recorded in Map Book 28, Page 111 of the aforesaid records a distance of 93.93 feet to a point, thence North 05° -50' - 45" West 163.00 feet to a point, thence Eastwardly and along the South line of Wimbledon Drive East 209.68 feet to the point of beginning.

#### BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundary conforms to the present legal dimensions of the lot.
