DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Presbyterian church in Malad is a small and unpretentious brick chapel on a stone foundation, dating from 1882. It is basically rectangular in plan, with front-facing gables on the centered, enclosed, outset east entry porch and on the facade. A small wing at left rear, with a north-facing gable and exterior chimney, produces a minimally L-shaped plan. The fabric of the church is red brick. Decoration is confined to simple geometric trim on the vergeboards on the porch, and segmental arches of double-course header bricks on all wall openings. The interior has been remodeled from its historic condition, but the only exterior alterations are new doors and entry steps, a ridgebeam cross of recent vintage and a conduit box on the rear wing.

### **TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Red-brick architecture, dating from the last quarter of the 19th century and particularly characterized by gabled roofs and segmentally arched openings, is prominent in the architectural endowment of a number of small towns near the southeast Idaho-northeast Utah border: Oakley, Samaria and y Elba are examples. Malad City has experienced more growth, and the red-brick survivals are rarer. The Presbyterian Church near the center of town; however, is a neat example of the style and period. Its physical centrality also implies its institutional importance in early Malad.

The community originated with Mormon settlers in 1864, and gentile freighters and stage drivers soon made Malad an important base on the Montana road from Salt Lake. In a clash that developed after 1874 between Mormon and anti-Mormon elements in the area, a Presbyterian mission school founded at Malad in 1878 received school district support and had so many pupils (as a public as well as mission school) that a brick chapel (the building nominated) was built in 1882 to accomodate them in a structure superior to the original log and sod schoolhouse, which had overflowed into the upper floor of a downtown store. (The mother of D. L. Evans, a leading Mormon in Malad, also allowed the mission school to use her house.)

The rear of the 1882 chapel-school house functioned as a parsonage. Public support was discontinued after the Mormons regained their franchise, and (like most such private schools - Mormon and non-Mormon) this mission school was discontinued in 1908.

After a fire in 1918, the entire interior was rededicated as a place of worship. It remains in that use today.
