

Description

The Elder/Moffitt House was constructed in 1894. The builder is unknown. The building is constructed with Queen Anne Cottage architectural style influences and represents the Mass Vernacular property type. It retains integrity of design, materials and workmanship. The Elder/Moffitt House is presently utilized as a single family dwelling.

The Elder/Moffitt House is located in Block M, Lot 7 of the University Addition. The University Addition was originally platted in 1887. The building faces south onto West Taylor Street. The streetscape along West Taylor Street is characterized by modest, working class residences of both historic and contemporary construction. No outbuildings exist on the site. A chain link fence extends across the front of the property line.

The Elder/Moffitt House is a L-shaped, one-story building of wood frame construction. The building measures 25 x 25 feet. The hip roof is intersected by a gable roof covering an off-set ell at the facade. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The building features clapboard siding and has a stone foundation.

Exterior features include a recessed entry veranda with wood posts supported on a wood porch deck. Windows, located discretely along the walls, are wood, double hung with one over one lite sash. Two off-center entries contain original wood panel glazed doors. Important architectural elements include a boxed cornice eave treatment, jig-cut brackets at the porch posts, cantons with crown molding, and diamond shaped shingles at the gable head.

Alterations are limited to a sensitive wood frame addition along the west facade.

Statement of Significance

The Elder/Moffitt House is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Built in 1894 and constructed with Queen Anne Cottage architectural style influences, the Elder/Moffitt House is representative of the Mass Vernacular property type. The Elder/Moffitt House is also important in the area of Community Planning. As one of only nine nineteenth century buildings remaining in the University Addition which was originally platted in 1887, the Elder/Moffitt House represents a rare example of its period and the historic context "Nineteenth Century Community Development in Phoenix."

A common design format for residences built in Phoenix during the nineteenth century was the Mass Vernacular house. Those building efforts were based, not on architectural design, but on the shared cultural experiences and abilities of their builders. Built of machine made and commercial materials, the houses often took into account past or contemporary trends in architectural style, although manifested in very simplified or provincialized elements. The Elder/Moffitt House exemplifies that type of residential architecture and illustrates a traditional design based on a simple Queen Anne style form and details. The common characteristics of the mass vernacular, Queen Anne inspired house type are well represented in the Elder/Moffit House and include a square plan with hipped roof, intersected by an off-set ell with gable roof, recessed entry veranda, and

the use of dimensioned lumber, milled weatherboard, and wood shingles. Queen Anne style influences include the gable head distinguished by diamond shaped shingles and articulated by a wood frieze board band, boxed eaves with cornice molding, jig-cut brackets and turned wood posts at the porch, and cantons with classical trim.
