St. Mary's Episcopal Church is located on the south side of Edgewood Road in Middlesborough, Kentucky. The building is a short distance (one city block) north of the main downtown area. This downtown area was included on the National Register in 1983. The church was built in late 1890 and first opened for services on February 15, 1891. It is located on the original site. There have been some very minor changes in the outside appearance of the structure. These have been primarily in different colors of paint used from the original shade. The interior of the church has not changed from its original appearance with the exception of the basement. None of the minor alterations, both interior and exterior, detract in any great fashion from the church's historic character. A parish house is located on the lot (built 1938-41) but is not attached to the church.

The church is 60' long and 24' wide. It is shaped in the classic gothic style of a cross. The Nave is 43'9" long and has a single center asile. There are 23 pews, all of which date to the construction of the church. The choir is 12'8" long and contains the original pulpit and eagle lectern that were donated by those who originally established the parish. The sanctuary is 13' by 17'8" and has an unusual recessed back wall. The front entrance of the church has a 10' by 10' porch. The steep pitched roof is 30' high at the highest point. On the northwest end of the roof is an 18' high belfry topped with a cross. The original bell is still functional and rung regularly. It should be noted that the alter, church bell and two chancel chairs (all still in use) were given by Alexander A. Arthur.

An especially special feature of the structure is the large stained glass window in the south transcept. This large, three part window was purchased at the time of the church's construction from Tiffany and Company of London, England. A picture of the window is included in this nomination.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Saint Mary's Episcopal Church should be included on the National Register for two reasons. First, the church served as the religious home for wealthy British investors who worked to exploit the resources of the area in a large scale venture at the close of the 19th Century. Secondly, the church survives as one of the finest examples in Southeastern Kentucky of gothic revival architecture. The church is one of the few wooden buildings that survived a series of fires during Middlesborough's boom era. Therefore, its architecture reflects that of the wooden structures in Middlesborough that were replaced with Brick buildings after the fires.

The American Association Ltd. was founded by Alexander A. Arthur to attract investment in the area by wealthy British investors. Many of the new British residents were members of the Church of England and found the Episcopal Chruch a logical church home in this country. Alexander Arthur, Frank and Edgar Watts and others were all part of the early founders of Saint Mary's Chruch. One of the first five churches built in Middlesborough, it played an integral part in the early efforts to "Christianize" the boom town atmosphere of the area. Many of the objects associated with the church were given by wealthy English residents, but also by generous individuals in England. All of these early gifts are still in the church and in use today.

Its significance is also derived from its architecture and construction. Although the builder/designer is unknown, it survives virtually unaltered as an example of gothic revival style as interpreted in a church structure. During the town's building in the late 1880's and early 90's, the first structures were almost entirely made from wood as was Saint Mary's. The corner stone was laid November 11, 1890 and construction was completed February, 1891. The lots for the church were donated by the Middlesborough Town and Land Company, a subsidary of the American Association Ltd..
